Beloved in Christ:

Let us offer our heartfelt thanks and glory to God for granting us a New Year 2021! Who would have expected one year ago that we would face a universal pandemic and its effects on each one of us in every respect, whether physically, emotionally, financially, morally or spiritually? Yet, even in the face of this pandemic, we must continue to have faith and confess boldly – especially in this Season of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ’s Nativity and Baptism – that “*God is with us.*” (Isaiah 7:14)

As we prepare to celebrate *the Holy Theophany of our Lord on January 6*, we must understand that the Orthodox Church from its earliest years

has appointed this Great and Holy Feast as a means of spiritual renewal – and moreover, a renewal of our own Baptism – as echoed in the petitions and prayers of the Great Blessing of the Water that is integral to the Feast. The full celebration of the ancient Feast of Holy Theophany assumes the gathering of the faithful in the Church – just as we were physically present for our own Baptism – for both the Divine Liturgy and the Blessing of the Water (the latter service can also be celebrated near a body of water): As an extension of this service, it is customary during this season to have the priest offer the Blessing of Homes, which drives out demons, heals diseases of every kind and provides protective grace. With Holy Theophany, our loving and merciful Lord, Who humbled Himself to be baptized at the hands of St. John the Forerunner, offers each one of us, who are His children by grace, yet another invitation and opportunity to actively engage in spiritual renewal.

This much needed spiritual renewal provided through these holy services is something we may desire but, sadly, we may find it difficult to pursue, due to prolonged restrictions and the discomfort of many still after so many months of the pandemic. While many of us have slowly started coming back to Church, there are still many more who have stayed away: Moreover, due to the extended period of physical separation from the worship and Holy Sacraments, many have also become spiritually complacent and stayed away from live-steamed Church Services, a life of prayer, fasting, and the regular reading of Holy Scriptures, lives of the Saints and Orthodox spiritual books. Admittedly our physical participation in the spiritual life in the Church is challenged not only by the COVID 19 pandemic, but equally so by societal pressures and the oppressive 24/7 news reports and social media which consume us.

St. Paul's words to the ancient Church in Rome are still relevant in our very different times: *"I appeal to you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that you may prove what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."* (Romans 12:1-2) Just as Jesus was incarnate – that is, He took on flesh for our salvation – our faith must be practiced in a holistic way, in body, mind and spirit. Jesus initiated our spiritual

lives through His own Baptism, but we must freely and wholly allow His operative grace – which we received at the time of our Baptism – to be at work in us through an active physical, emotional and spiritual life in His Church and, equally so, by separating ourselves from those things that distract or detract us from living a transformed life that is pleasing to God.

Clearly, our spiritual renewal will require much effort and perhaps some baby steps at this time, especially with all we are facing. To begin, we must have faith that God heals us and grants us grace and spiritual growth in all His Holy Sacraments; we must become more mindful of God's Presence each day and disciplined in our prayer and fasting; we must cut out needless and harmful addictions to manipulative media, and instead partake of the necessary food for our souls through holy readings; we must repent regularly of our egotistical ways and strive to love, pray for, forgive and serve one another; and we must become more charitable, just as He is generous toward us in every respect. Indeed, spiritual regeneration is possible in these times – in the words of St. Paisios of Mt. Athos: *"Desire and effort must come from you. God will provide the power and result."*

Parish Council Report

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! Needless to say, 2020 has been a very rough year that has truly tested our Faith and conviction. May God grant us the strength and courage to go forward into 2021 with optimism and hope, and to put aside any pessimism we may have, for pessimism is seriously constricting and limiting. Helen Keller once wrote: “No pessimist ever discovered the secrets of the stars or sailed to an uncharted land or opened a new heaven to the human spirit.” As Christians, we must choose to be optimistic about the future, and truly believe that our lives will get better and return to normal, believe that we can again greet each other warmly, believe that our children can return to their classrooms, believe that we can again work in our jobs and businesses without worry of being limited or shut down, believe that we can again visit our families and friends without fear of the unknown, and most of all, believe that we will again have the freedom to worship in our Faith without limitations.

We want to again thank everyone who have worked so hard and contributed so much of their time, talents, and treasures to keep our Church going during these most difficult of times. Even though we lost a significant portion of our revenue stream this year due to COVID, with the cancellation of the Greek Food Festival and the Agape Picnic, the downturn in collections from trays and candles especially during Holy Week, the cancellation of various fund-raising events, and the cancellation of events scheduled in Panos Hall, through the grace of God we made it. We made it through with the many generous contributions from our Parishioners through Stewardship, with the many large contributions we received from several of our Parishioners, with the help of PPP forgivable loans, and through the hard work of Skip Ruffner, a Grant from the State. In addition, we made it through because of the efforts of Nitsa Filios and Cheryl Pandelis, who worked so hard in getting our Mortgage paid off in full, and retired. Their efforts translated into a reduction of our annual expenses in an amount of around \$65,000. Their efforts could not have been timelier, given the restrictions foisted upon us by the Pandemic. As we continue forward on our journey, we urge each and every one of you who have the means, to continue contributing to help provide for and maintain the future of our Church.

As most of you know, we are in the midst of our annual Stewardship Drive. This past year, we had one of our best years in terms of Stewardship giving. We surpassed our 2020 Budget goal and actually reached the increased amount that we set forth in the 2021 Budget, without attributing several of the large gifts we received from several Parishioners. With that said, we hope to do better going into 2021. This past year with all the upheaval and turmoil, there is no question that Faith in God and our Church has been categorically paramount. As you know, Stewardship is the method that we as Parishioners have chosen to keep our Church operating. It also allows us to build toward our future, and its importance to our future cannot be over emphasized. We know that times are tough, but as you contemplate your Stewardship contributions, please remember the many Blessings you have received, pray and look into your heart, and thoughtfully look to “Giving Back,” with your time, talents and treasures.

We recently held our elections for the Parish Council. Congratulations to John Koutsulis on his reelection to the Council, and congratulations to Nick Barbarino, June Likourinou, Spero Demoleas and Constantinos Kanis on their first time election to the Council. In addition, we want to thank our outgoing members of the Parish Council – Skip Ruffner, Mark Karris, Jennia Szukiewicz and Demetrious Asim – for all their hard work and service to the Church. They will truly be missed, and we fervently hope that they will in the near future choose to serve again. The new Parish Council will take the Oath of Office during the Liturgy *on Sunday, January 10, 2021*. Following the Dismissal of the Liturgy, the new Parish Council will remain in the Church to elect this year’s Officers.

As many of you are aware, we had a tie between two outstanding Parishioners – Spiros Filios and Kouli Pouridis – for the final seat on the Council. Many have asked how this matter will be ultimately decided. Pursuant to the Uniform Parish Regulations and our Parish Bylaws, there will be vote by the new Parish Council to decide the matter at the first Parish Council Meeting *on Tuesday, January 19, 2021*. It is unfortunate that we cannot have both Parishioners join the Council, because both have given so much of themselves in the past to the Church and hopefully they will in the future continue to give, no matter the outcome.

However, given the current state of affairs, we believe that September will be a more appropriate and prudent time in which to have it, especially in terms of planning. 




From Father Seraphim

*“What does it profit, my brethren, if someone says he has faith but does not have works?
Can faith save him? . . . But someone will say, “You have faith, and I have works.”
Show me your faith without your works, and I will show you my faith by my works.
. . . For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.”
(James 2:14, 18, 26)*

January has brought us a New Year, and perhaps this year more than many others people will be keen to set a New Year’s Resolution – leaving behind what many may remember as “the worst year ever.” Resolutions commonly include goals concerning the health of the body, or more honestly, its aesthetic appearance. There is certainly nothing wrong with investing time and energy into being healthy, but unfortunately in our Christian lives bodily *asceticism* – struggle and discipline leading to spiritual health of the soul – is often sorely neglected if not utterly forgotten.

The heresy of “faith alone” has slipped into too many of us Orthodox Christians. Many have tried to live solely by their minds and spirits without any physical relationship and embodiment of their faith – through holy exercises like doing full body prostrations, waking up at night to pray or keep vigil, or taking the fasting practices of the Church seriously. The Holy Gospels reveal that our Lord Jesus Christ practiced asceticism through fasting, kneeling, and keeping night vigils! Yet, if someone should start to express faith in concrete actions – through obedience to our Lord and the Tradition of the Church itself – they are often accused of “*trying to save themselves through works only*,” or worse, are called one of the commonly deployed and deplorably inaccurate words, *fanatic*, *zealot*, or *radical*. The result of this binary division between faith and works (addressed above in the verses from St. James’ epistle) is that we have once again begun to employ to the ancient false teaching of Gnosticism, acting as if our spirits or souls are the “real us” and our bodies are just a shell that needs eventual escaping. This mistaken paradigm has even affected certain views on gender and identity – leading some to believe that their soul’s true gender does not match up with the physical one – and there is a temptation to live by a disembodied faith.



Why does the *bodily* Resurrection of Christ mean so much to us? Christ showed us that all human beings (made up of the conjoined body and soul) are destined for the Resurrection: Body and soul belong together even in eternity! Many of the great Fathers of the Church taught us that the spiritual struggle is *with* the body and *for* the body. Now, just as we have all learned by February of most years, resolutions are difficult to keep; likewise it is difficult in these times of comfort and technology to not become like the ancient Gnostics. It is not easy to live *ascetically*, with intentionally repeated spiritual exercises involving our souls and bodies. Preserving bodily wholeness is also difficult in today’s confusing culture in which sleeping together is expected in courtship or even dating!

What then can we do when pilgrimages, involving bodily toil and a sacrifice of money to end up at a beautiful spiritual oasis, are expensive and require using scarce and valuable vacation days? Fasting is inconvenient and we do not know the right recipes or where to eat: Giving up our favorite foods to gain a deeper love for Christ and self-control is not even talked about outside of Church circles. Standing in our homes to pray, doing prostrations, spiritual reading, hospitality and generosity – all of it is disagreeable and uncomfortable to the fallen part of us that demands self-worship, pleasure, ease and comfort. We must all consider, however, what role our body plays in our spiritual life. What happens when we do not struggle and do these ascetic practices? Do we want a spiritual path and a salvation that does not involve our bodies? Because if so, then our spirituality may be classically or philosophically “Greek” – that is, pagan – but it is no longer Christian or Orthodox.

though generosity. No, this will not be another reflection pleading for attention and support – we have written, and you have read, innumerable articles like that in the past.

Finally, lest you think this month’s reflection a bit meager, I will leave you to ponder this 5th Century nugget from St. Leo the Great:

“What is offered from a little is great, and in the scale of divine justice, the quantity of gifts is not measured, but the steadfastness of souls. The widow in the Gospel put two coins into the treasury, and this surpassed the gifts of all the rich. No mercy is worthless before God. No compassion is fruitless. He has given different resources to human beings but He does not ask different affections.”

In his recently published masterpiece, *The Ethics of Beauty*, Dr. Timothy Patitsas poses a great question to each and every one of us: *“If I allow my body no role whatsoever in my service to God, let alone the central role it deserves and demands, then what is the point in confessing faith in God Incarnate, of celebrating Christmas, or that Christ is risen bodily from the dead, of hoping for my own bodily resurrection, of receiving the Body and Blood of Christ, or even being baptized? . . . If, like me, you don’t fast much, nor make prostrations, nor pray in such a way that brings bodily fatigue, nor receive sufferings as spiritual ‘medicine’ from God, then let us begin anew together!”*

As we look out upon a brand New Year, like a fresh snowfall – totally pure and unspoiled – let us help and encourage one another to try once more: May we invoke and call upon the abundant and freely given grace of our God, Who lived in and took upon Himself our flesh, in 2021 to set and keep attainable resolutions that will have eternal consequences.





If you have never been climbing before, here is what you need to know:

- ✦ You do not have to have experience or be in amazing shape.
- ✦ Wear comfortable clothing. We have free shoes for you to use – toddler to size 15!
- ✦ Tell the people at the front desk that you are new and would like help – if they are too busy to do it, they will find someone who can.
- ✦ When you are on your own, do not be afraid to ask someone for tips on the climb you are trying. We all started in the same place once, and it is immensely satisfying to see people improve with tips you are given.

It is easy to get started if you try bouldering first: There is no “safety equipment.” The floor is covered with a foot of foam and vinyl. If you fall, it is a cushioned fall. Generally our fear of falling is what keeps us from getting into too much trouble. You do not have to get to the top. You just have to have fun and do your best.

Born in Tsarist Russia in 1896 and the spiritual child of Staretz Silouan (St. Silouan of Mt. Athos), St. Sophrony considered meeting his spiritual father to be one of the greatest gifts God had ever bestowed upon him. This book reflects his ardent desire, according to translator Rosemary Edmonds, "to record the precepts which had so helped him to find his bearings in the wide expanses of the spirit by instructing him in ways of spiritual combat." This discipleship moved St. Sophrony toward the endeavor of knowledge of God beyond mere intellection – a reality akin to theophany and true illumination in the Orthodox Church.


From *His Life is Mine*:

"What is the essence of Christian contemplation? . . . As I was taught, true contemplation begins the moment we become aware of sin in us . . . To apprehend sin in oneself is a spiritual act, impossible without grace, without the drawing near to us of Divine Light. . . The first manifestations of this Uncreated Light do not allow us to experience it as light. It shines in a secret way, illuminating the black darkness of our inner world to disclose the spectacle that is far from joyous for us in our normal state of fallen being. We feel a burning sensation. This is the beginning of real contemplation – which has nothing in common with intellectual or philosophical contemplation."

If you are wishing to explore the depths of the spiritual disciplines of the Orthodox Church that lead us beyond the non-stop ruminations of philosophy or secular reasoning, then this book is for you! Our store also offers another selection by St. Sophrony on the writings of St. Silouan called *Wisdom from Mount Athos*, and we will soon have the icon set of both Saints on hand.




