From Father John


Beloved in Christ:

Do we ever stop and think about the power of our words – or the accountability we must have for

what we say or write or post online? As a priest, I could be culturally categorized as a nanoinfluencer: I am a public figure and speaker, although I avoid creating content on social media, and I am not consciously seeking people to follow me. Instead, I am actively engaged as a "fisher of men and women" to be followers of our Lord Jesus Christ and His Holy Orthodox Church.



Realistically, whether I see it or not, and whether I like it or not, I am an influencer by grace and virtue of the ordination I received and as such, I am highly mindful about the words coming through my lips or fingertips (even as I write this). If we think about it, all of us are influencers, in one way or another: As parents, in our professions, as teachers, through our military rank, as civic leaders, among our peers, as Godparents, in our volunteer organizations – and increasingly so, through our online presence and activity. While we are hopefully mindful of the influence we have and use our words appropriately (and in a Godly fashion, if we are Christians), we must admittedly and painfully also be aware that there are too many times when we carelessly and thoughtlessly utter insensible words toward others, without regard to the effect on their souls – and moreover, how our words offend God!



We are increasingly reaping the consequences of abusive, bullying and harassing words in our homes, our relationships in our schools, in our workplaces, and more so, online in various forms. Left unresolved, these harmful words become the seeds of anger, resentment and alienation that are rooted deeply in the souls of so many: Over time, these seeds multiply and yield negative and hurtful patterns of dialog and chatter which, once reaching over-saturation, explode into the evergrowing hateful and divisive rhetoric we experience everywhere in our country, and throughout the world. "So the tongue is a little member and boasts of great things," wrote the Holy Apostle James, the First Bishop of Jerusalem. "How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is an unrighteous world among our members, staining the whole body, setting on fire the cycle of nature, and set on fire by hell." (James 3:5-6)

Hundreds of years later, Elder Ephraim of Arizona, echoing the teachings of the Holy Church Fathers, wrote, "Whoever guards his tongue guards his soul from great sins and grievous falls."



The Holy Elder of blessed memory continued: "I beg that you not criticize one another, for this is downright egotism. . . . Be particularly afraid of inner criticism, that is, thoughts of criticism, because it does not come to light through the spoken word, in which case it is likely to be corrected by someone who hears it . . . (and) which imperceptibly makes us fatally guilty and deprives us of the life of Divine grace and offers as a most bitter drink the death of the soul." The only remedy for our out-of-control



words is repentance, wrote the Elder, quoting Abba Arsenios, a Desert Father: "I have often repented for speaking, but I have never repented for keeping silent." ("On Condemnation," Counsels from the Holy Mountain)

Finally, let us "walk carefully" as we approach Church for the Divine Services. "Do not be hasty with your mouth. And do not let your heart be quick to utter a word before God: For God is in Heaven, and you are on Earth; therefore, let your words be few." (Ecclesiastes 5:1) Yes, the passions are especially aroused and activated when we gather to worship: Let us therefore be attentive to what we hear, see, think and speak, keeping our hearts and minds toward the Lord.

We are not at the finish line yet, but we are getting close.




See Something, Say Something!

Iconography Phase 4: We are Nearing the End!

"We venerate Your immaculate Icon, O good Lord . . ."
(Hymn for the Sunday of Orthodoxy)

Beloved in Christ:

Glory to God for All Things! By God's grace, 4 of the 6 Festal Icons – the Nativity of Christ, the Crucifixion, the Resurrection, and the Pentecost Icons – are fully donated!

There is still an opportunity to participate in this blessed project, which will be the final Phase of Iconography in our beloved St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church. As of today, we have received \$55,000 in donations for the **Ascension Icon** and are seeking \$5,000 to complete this Icon.

High above the entrance into the Nave will be the glorious Icon of The Second Coming of Our Lord Jesus Christ. God's plan of Judgment and Salvation is affirmed in the Holy Gospels and New Testament Epistles, the Book of Revelation, and the Creed. Moreover, the Last Judgment is commemorated every year on Meat Fare Sunday (Apokreas) in the last week before Great and Holy Lent. This is the appropriate Icon to complete the Great Feasts of our Lord because His Second Coming is the culmination of His plan of salvation for the world.

We are inviting you to participate in donating this Icon: We have received a \$5,000 donation and we are requesting \$55,000 more at \$5,000 minimum offerings for this magnificent Icon.

With 12 more donations (1 for the Ascension, and 11 for the Second Coming) at \$5,000 each, the entire Festal Icons in the ceiling will be fully donated! Now is the time for us to respond prayerfully and generously, for by this time next year we all will be inspired by the Heavenly Grandeur and Divine Grace of Phase 4 of our Iconography! Again, it is a blessing to participate in this final Phase of Iconography in our beloved Church!

St. Philip, the Apostle of the 70

St. Philip the Deacon is one of the seven deacons first appointed by the Holy Apostles in Jerusalem. (Acts 6:1-7) After the preaching and subsequent stoning of St. Stephen the Deacon (Acts 7), Saul appears to have initiated an aggressive persecution of the Church in Jerusalem. (Acts 8:1-3) All but the Holy Apostles were "scattered" throughout the region. Philip went North to the city of Samaria (Acts 8:4-25) where he preached and healed, amazing the residents. Apparently, the miracles were so amazing that a popular magician, Simon, converted and began following Philip. The Holy Apostles, upon hearing of the widespread acceptance of the Holy Gospel in Samaria, sent Peter and John who Baptized many in the Holy Spirit.

While Peter and John returned to Jerusalem, preaching to Samaritan villages along the way, God called Philip to head South to Gaza (Acts 8:26-40), along a wilderness road. On the road, he met an Ethiopian Eunuch returning home from pilgrimage in Jerusalem, who was also a respected counselor to Candace, the Ethiopian Queen. He was apparently reading the



Prophet Isaiah out loud on his way home. God called Philip to join the Ethiopian, and a lively discussion of Scripture and Jesus ensued; following, the Ethiopian asked to be immediately Baptized in nearby water. As they left the water, the Spirit snatched Philip away to the northern city of Azotus, and he preached his way north to Caesarea, where he appears to have remained.

The last Scriptural reference to St. Philip is when he and his four unmarried daughters, each with the gift of prophecy, hosted Paul in his home along with his companions as they traveled through Caesarea. (Acts 21:7-10) Due to his consistent work of preaching as he journeyed throughout the region, Philip the Deacon is also known as Philip the Evangelist. (Acts 21:8) But St. Philip the Deacon and St. Philip the Apostle are different and often confused.

Little is known of Philip's daughters, though they are referred to as prophets not only in the Book of Acts, but by Eusebius, who places them alongside Agabus (Acts II:27-28; 21:10), Judas, and Silas. (Acts I5:22, 27, 32) Holy Tradition holds that two of his daughters remained with Philip through his old age. Their names may have been Irais and Charliline (or Mariamne), though these are names given by Tradition far from their historical existence. The other two, Hermione and Eutychis (or Eutychiane or Eukhidia) traveled to and evangelized in Ephesus. Hermione suffered at the hands of the Emperors Trajan and Hadrian, making her a martyr of the Church. She is commemorated by the Orthodox Church on September 4. There is speculation that the recently uncovered 1600-year-old Byzantine Basilica in Ashdod Yam may have been built to bury the body of one of Philip's daughters.

St. Philip is commemorated *on October II*. The Orthodox Church also includes Philip among the Seventy Apostles *(Luke 10:1-20)* and refer to him as a Protodeacon ("first" deacon). As a member of the Seventy, he is also celebrated on January 4 as a part of the feast of the "Synaxis of the Seventy Apostles."

It is worth noting the result of Philip's interaction with the Ethiopian Eunuch. As a eunuch, he was likely captured, enslaved, and castrated as a youth. His castration may have meant that he was not allowed to enter the temple in Jerusalem (*Deuteronomy 23:1*), even as a foreigner on pilgrimage to the Holy City. His identity as an "Ethiopian" does not indicate his nation but rather is a generic Greek term for dark-skinned Africans. He also appears to be a person of significant trust and authority, serving as counselor and treasurer for Queen Candace, a name given to all the female rulers of the region of Kush (now northern Sudan). His religious status is ambiguous and he could have been a convert to Judaism, though his castration may have precluded his full membership, while others argued that as a dark-skinned African, he must have been a Gentile. His reading of *Isaiah 53:7-8* perhaps reflects his own struggle with suffering as the result of injustice: "*In His humiliation justice was denied Him.*" (Acts 8:33; Isaiah 53:8) (Continued on Page 11)

Surely Philip's story of the unjust persecution of our Lord, Jesus Christ, His death at the hand of civil and religious authorities, and His Resurrection underlay the Eunuch's insistence on being immediately baptized in the nearest patch of water available. Once Philip disappeared, the Eunuch joyfully returned home. Tradition has it that he evangelized his homeland, the Kingdom of Kush, which was conquered by Aksum in the 4th century. Aksum is the ancient name for the region now known as Ethiopia. The Ethiopian Orthodox Church understands one of its earliest converts to Christianity to be "Simon Bachos the Eunuch" who Irenaeus of Lyons (Against the Heresies 3:12:8, circa 180) identifies as the eunuch Philip met on the road to Gaza. This connection is also reflected in the works of Eusebius of Caesarea and Origen of Alexandria.





Greetings from the Bookstore!

New from St. Sebastian Press and featured this month is *Types and Symbols in the Bible* by Christopher Lockwood. Intended to be read alongside and in consideration of the Scriptures, it is a great companion book as we head into the new Church Year and begin the new cycle of readings including hymns and daily prayers. Specifically, we learn about how the coming of Christ and the Church "fulfill and complete the faith of the Old Testament Israelites."

Lockwood further explains that "everything written down in the Holy Scriptures had to be fulfilled in order for God's promises, spoken on oath to the righteous patriarchs and prophets of old, to be shown to be true. The Christian faith must therefore be seen not as a restoration of something which had been lost, or a novel invention of clever men, but as a continuation and fulfillment of that which was already clearly present and established by God Almighty." That which was "already present" is revealed in Old Testament types and symbols and how they came to be fully expressed in Jesus Christ.



From the back cover: Many regard the Bible today as a book that records events which are already complete, which should only be interpreted literally or historically. Approaching Holy Scripture through types and symbols, however, reveals the hidden and infinite mystery contained in its pages. This transforms the faithful reader from a passive viewer of distant events into an active communicant of that eternal mystery, making it possible to find the living Christ on every page.

Looking ahead, our focus will be on completing the final phase of our Iconography project. In just 10 short months, our Iconographers will return to install these magnificent works of sacred art.


Our second installment payment is due in December, and we are making great progress thanks to your generosity:
