

Beloved in Christ:

As we approach the *Great Feast of Holy Pentecost on Sunday, June 7* – which is celebrated fifty days after Holy Pascha – we, like the Holy Apostles, will experience the descent of the Holy and Life-Giving Spirit both in the Divine Liturgy and the Kneeling Vespers which will follow. Best of all, we are anticipating doing so together again in the Church – albeit in a

safe and socially distanced manner for the time being – following over two months of restrictions which kept us from gathering as the Body of Christ due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Except for a handful of us who have been allowed to worship on behalf of our large Greek Orthodox community and for live-streaming purposes, the vast majority of us have been deprived of the Holy Mysteries (Sacraments) for an extended period – so much so, that I feel it is prudent for me to address the centrality of the Divine Mysteries in the life of the Church.

During His Passion, our Lord Jesus Christ washed the feet of His Disciples and supped with them, during which He instituted the Holy Eucharist: "He who eats My Flesh and drinks My Blood has eternal Life . . ." (John 6:54) After partaking of the sacred meal, Judas Iscariot left to betray Him – and our Lord, knowing that His time had arrived to become the Sacrificial Lamb for the life of the world, then engaged in a long dialog, which included His promise that He would not leave them orphans: "But the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, Whom the Father will send in My Name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you." (John 14:18, 26)



The fulfilment of our Lord's promise occurred on the Day of Pentecost: "They were all together in one place. . . And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit . . ." (Acts 2:1-4) After being ordained with the Life-Giving Spirit, the Holy Apostles were emboldened to preach the "good news" of the Crucified and Risen Christ in various languages to the many pilgrims who had gathered in Jerusalem. On that very day, in accordance with our Lord's command, the Holy Apostles Baptized 3,000 people with water and the Holy Spirit – and celebrated the Divine Liturgy and offered the Holy Eucharist, just as He had instructed them. For almost 2,000 years, the Holy Mysteries have been integral to the spiritual life of all those who are received into the Body of Christ through Baptism. Along with Baptism, the Holy Mysteries are Chrismation, Confession, Communion (Eucharist), Ordination, Unction (Prayer Oil) and Marriage. Through these Divine Mysteries we freely receive the gifts of God's Kingdom, grace upon grace, healing, forgiveness, sanctification, and moreover union with Him and our fellow Orthodox Christians.

Before our Lord Ascended into Heaven, He commissioned His Apostles to "go forth and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) – and Holy Pentecost marked the beginning of the Apostolic Mission of the Church, through preaching, teaching and uniting believers in the Holy Mysteries. The Apostolic Mission of the Church continues still today – and this holy labor is needed now more than ever, as we live in a world in which our Orthodox Christian Faith is questioned in the face of viruses, afflictions, unemployment, poverty, fear, self-centeredness, hatred, violence, skepticism and growing immorality and godlessness. Valeriu Gafencu, who suffered imprisonment for his faith during the Communist period in Romania, was asked once what was necessary to build the Christian world, and his words are ever so relevant! "It is good to model ourselves after the classic example of the Apostolic community: To know Christian teaching well in order to see how it can be applied in the present; to unite ourselves in common effort, guided by the light of the Holy Spirit; to live in a community of love according to the will of God; to pray, to liturgize, to unite ourselves with Christ, in order that we may be in His Kingdom through grace and power." (The Saint of the Prisons, p. 252)

As we slowly return to public worship, we will notice some measures that have been implemented for the respect, health and protection of all our worshipers: Yet even with these in place, the Divine Liturgy will



be celebrated in the customary manner. While some, even among our beloved Parish members, may question or challenge our liturgical practices surrounding the Holy Mysteries, we must not allow our sacred and ancient Faith to become a point of division; instead we are encouraged to further study the Holy Scriptures and the teachings of our ancient Orthodox Church, remaining prayerful, loving, patient and empathetic with one another. We have been away from the physical Church for over two months: It will understandably take a while for us to adjust to returning to our spiritual home and, for some, receiving the Holy Mysteries again.

God's operative grace will be, as it has been from the beginning, present in each celebration of the Holy Mysteries and ever so in the Divine Eucharist, which St. Ignatios called "the Medicine of Immortality." At every Divine Liturgy, we will be invited to approach the Holy Chalice "with the fear of God, with faith and with love," – and we must draw near knowing full well, without a shadow of doubt, that we are approaching the Living God, Who gave us life out of love and Who came into the world to conquer death and grant us eternal Life.

It is indeed a great blessing for us to worship and receive the Holy Mysteries in our Church – and we must never again take these blessings for granted. Moreover, with gratitude to God, may we seize this opportunity to eagerly share with others about the grace and Life that abound in the Orthodox Church.

Parish Council Report We are working very hard toward getting our Church reopened, which requires us to have in place, a detailed reopening plan commensurate and in compliance with Federal, State and Local Government guidelines, and guidelines from the Archdiocese and Metropolis of San Francisco, for dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic. Our plan entitled, "The COVID-19 Reopening Plan for St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church, Las Vegas,

Nevada" (hereinafter the "Plan"), was submitted to the Metropolis for approval. We are attaching a full copy of the Plan, along with this issue of "The Desert Messenger." We urge everyone to read it and become familiar with it.

The Plan is very detailed and we know there is going to be some measure of consternation on the part of Parishioners in implementing the Plan, and we fervently hope that everyone will understand the constraints under which we are having to operate. It is essential that the entire Parish work together with "one mind and one voice" as we move forward. As we reopen, the Health and Safety of our Parishioners is paramount. It is incumbent upon everyone to comply with all safety guidelines, including but not limited to maintaining social distancing; wearing a mask at all times during Services; refraining from attending services if you are ill or if you are in a higher risk group for severe illness from COVID-19; washing your hands frequently; avoiding touching your eyes, mouth and face; practicing good Respiratory Hygiene by covering your mouths and noses with a bent elbow or tissue when your cough or sneeze; and avoiding touching surfaces or door handles. We will have hand wash units outside the Church entrance and outside the entrance to Panos Hall. In addition, we will have automatic hand sanitizer units inside the Narthex and inside the North Atrium of Panos Hall. Because masks are mandatory (except for infants and toddlers), we will have extras on hand for people who do not have them; however, we still urge you to bring your own.

In a nutshell, there will be limited seating in the Church to comply with the appropriate social distancing criteria, along with additional limited seating in Panos Hall. We will live-stream the Church Services onto a large video screen in Panos Hall. The seating of Parishioners in the Church and in Panos Hall will require substantial involvement and direction by Parish Council Members and certain Designated Ushers, especially in the Church with its more limited seating capacity and configuration. In the Church, Parishioners will have to be personally and specifically seated by Parish Council Members and Designated Ushers. We urge everyone to follow instructions and cooperate. We know it will be very difficult implementing these things.

As of May 26, 2020, Phase 2 of Nevada's Reopening Plan only allows for 50 people to gather at places of worship. We are working to provide more opportunities for worship, so that more people have the opportunity to come and receive Holy Communion on a rotating basis. Once a greater amount of people are allowed to congregate, we can safely seat up to 125 to 130 people inside the Church and around 250 people in Panos Hall, while still maintaining the appropriate social distancing. With the continued loosening of the capacity restrictions, seating in the Church will be by reservation on a first come-first serve basis until the seating limitation is reached; thereafter, Parishioners will be directed into Panos Hall.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be administered by either or both Father John and Father Seraphim, in accordance with guidelines set by the Metropolis of San Francisco. The Blessed Antidoron will only be given by the Priests at the Dismissal of the Divine Liturgy. Unfortunately, there will be no Fellowship after Church until such time as more of the restrictions are lifted; we ask that after Services, all Parishioners maintain the appropriate social distancing while exiting the Church, and quickly leave the Church Premises.

Some other guidelines that will directly impact us include refraining from kissing the Icons in the Church, and refraining from kissing the hands of the Priests when receiving Antidoron. We know this is a very sore subject for many, and we truly empathize; however, these restrictions are based upon the mandated guidelines which consider the health and safety of our Parishioners. In addition, until all restrictions have been lifted, we will not have a Choir, and will have one adult Chanter/Singer at each of the two podiums at the front of the Church, and possibly one adult Chanter/Singer in the Choir Loft. We will only have two adult Acolytes assisting the Priest in the Altar and with Services. The reasons for these restrictions are to help maintain the 6-foot separation as much as feasible.

For candles, we will have designated Parish Council Members or Ushers handling all distribution of candles. Parishioners desiring to light candles will have the candles handed to them to light and place in the Pangari. Unfortunately, no one will be allowed to use the Cry Room due to the limited amount of space it has; therefore, the Cry Room will be locked at all times.

One requirement of the Metropolis is that we must have a roster of Parishioners who attend each Service. These rosters are solely intended for us to have the ability to directly notify Parishioners if it turns out a Parishioner who attended a particular Service was tested positive for COVID -19. These rosters will be maintained in the Church Office and will not be distributed or used for any other purpose. After a certain amount of time has passed, they will be appropriately discarded.

Please note that we will continue live-streaming all our Church Services, which we are doing through YouTube at https://youtube.com/vegasgreekorthodox.com. For information on our live-streamed Church Services, please go to our Church website at https://www.vegasgreekorthodox.com/. Again we would like to thank Bill and Erin Bruninga for making this happen.

On another note, prior to the COVID-19 Pandemic, several individuals contributed funds specifically to replace the entire roof on the Church. After considering five different bids – based upon pricing, scope of work, guarantees, timing, reputation, and other factors – the Parish Council voted to go with the "Original Roofing Company." The contract amount for the work is \$61,970, and includes the full scope of work we wanted performed. The only thing not covered in the contract amount is scaffolding, which we have been assured by the contractor that it will not be necessary. We also discussed with the contractor about any additional charges we might incur above the contract amount, and we were informed that there may be the need to replace around 10 to 15 sheets of plywood under some of the tiles, but we would not know for sure until the current tiles are removed. We anticipate starting in about two weeks. This job is critical to protect the Iconography in the Church.

In closing, we look forward to the time when we can all worship in Church together in person without fear and without restrictions. Again, please pray for those afflicted with this dreaded disease, for our medical personnel who are on the front lines fighting it, for our first responders, for those in the laboratories working on treatments and cures, for those who are working to provide much needed resources such as medical equipment and supplies, for our leaders to learn from mistakes and continue making the right decisions, for strength and toughness to endure these strange and challenging times, and most of all, for a speedy victory and end to the effects of this dreaded disease. We urge everyone to be safe, and to comply with the guidelines and mandates for dealing with and defeating COVID-19, and we urge everyone to take care of one another during these taxing times. The more we allow God to direct and guide our lives, the more power and blessings we are going to have. God Bless!





From Father Seraphim

June has become a month that makes me pause and reflect on my life. Why? It was on June 1, 2017 that I began serving alongside Father John and was assigned to the Parish of St. John the Baptist here in Las Vegas. It has been three years of growth, new life (two kids born here!), amazing milestones, and some difficulties and trials along the way. This June is much different than the previous two years: Due to the pandemic, we all have been apart for over two months, and June will be the month we will finally get back together in the Church for Divine Liturgy,



Holy Communion, and the Sacraments. This nine-week season of drought has provided us a rare opportunity of limited external activity. We have all been allowed to think deeply about our lives and about our dedication to Jesus Christ and *His Body, the Church – of which we are all members individually (I Corinthians 12:27)*. This world-affecting illness has also given each of us an opportunity to think about death, and not only death generally – but about our own personal mortality – and this can be an amazing opportunity and blessing.

The blessing for me has been to realize just how unprepared I am to stand before the Lord, and how unprepared I am for my own death. Perhaps we have all said the words, "If I had more time I would pray." Or, "If I had more time I would read a spiritual book or the Holy Scriptures." Whatever spiritual practice and activity we had been putting off because of our purported lack of time in the hustle and bustle of our daily lives, this pandemic allowed me to see that unless something is made into a priority within the busyness and daily grind of our life, even with a little more time, I will not do it. Then there are those others (doctors, nurses, delivery people, etc.) who probably were busier during the last nine weeks than they had been previously and this presented a different kind of challenge: That of courage and selfless love for the sick and dying, or longer shifts around the clock. I also think about all the parents who have received their children back from the school systems into their homes, while learning went online and all of the trials such a transition can bring. What does all this mean spiritually?

A crisis like the world is facing, allows each and every one of us to see how prepared we are to suffer (even a little bit), and just how we will react to things outside of our control. We do not have to guess or wonder: The crisis came and we all reacted, some better and some worse. Did we judge others for how they reacted? Did we become enraged or indignant? Did we help anyone else, *even one time* in the past eleven weeks? Were we frightened, and if so, what were we frightened about? These are just a few questions we could ask and try to honestly answer looking back at the calamitous times we have just come through.

Jesus gave some of the most difficult words in the Gospels when He said, "Whoever tries to save his life will lose it, whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospels will save it." (Matthew 16:25; Luke 17:33) We are all called to the acceptance of our own death by our Lord and Savior Who trampled down the power of death by His own Death, so that we can "save our lives" – our immortal souls – for eternal Life in the Kingdom of God. If Christians traditionally have not been afraid of death because of Christ's Resurrection and our reception of eternal Life in the Church, how many of our reactions have had as their motivations, the crippling and horrifying fear of death? Are we doing everything we can to try and "save our lives" in this world? At what expense to our Orthodox Faith and our hope for the Life of the age to come? What are we so tightly hanging onto here in this life and in this world?

Finally, I know that during this time, my personal faith has been tested. I remember at St. Nicholas Ranch Summer Camp one year, a fellow camp counselor asked me how to get more faith, acknowledging that his "faith is not very strong at all." Even the Apostles said to Christ, "Increase our faith." (Luke 17:5) I went up to the Monastery and asked Gerontissa Markella my fellow counselor's question. She said, "Our faith is directly related to how much we pray. If you want more faith, pray more." It was so simple, but so profound that it rang true in my soul. (Continued on Page 8)

As we all begin to come back into the Church – some with faith stronger than ever, and ready to receive Holy Communion, and some others among us genuinely fearful for their safety and health – we must remember the exhortation of the Apostle Paul, "We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves." (Romans 15:1) As we move forward with Church life once more, if we find that we do not have faith, we can devote ourselves more deeply to prayer, asking God to help us! We must remember that we participate in each other's salvation, and that we need each other, for no one is saved alone. We are saved in the Church, together – for this is the community of Faith that Jesus began and upon which He sent down the Holy Spirit. 



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Glory be to God for all things! These past couple of months have been "interesting," to say the least. We have all had our lives disrupted by the Coronavirus pandemic (COVID 19), including our ability to come into our beautiful Church to worship God and receive the Holy Sacraments. However, by His Grace, we have been able to "participate" in the Church Services through live-streaming. As the Lord said, "For where two or three are gathered together in My

Name, I am there in the midst of them." (Matthew 18:20) Truly, the participation of so many of us in the live-streamed Services shows that we are *"gathered together"* in His Name.

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

worshiping the undivided Trinity,
for the Trinity has saved us.
