From **Father** Iohn

Beloved in Christ:

"When you pass beside a hospital," wrote St. Paisios the Athonite (commemorated on *July 12*), "make the sign of the Cross three times: One for the patients; one for their relatives; and one

for yourself, because you aren't there." We might be fully vaccinated for COVID 19, but there are no guarantees in this life that we will not become ill from something else, or have a physical affliction, or get into an accident, or become a victim of a crime, which causes us to end up in the hospital. This is why our Lord Jesus Christ and the holy men and women who imitate His life teach us Christians to remember those who are sick - and to visit, tend to, and pray for them: Because it is the Godly thing to do, and by doing so we are mindful that we also could at some point become afflicted with illness and in need of the prayers and care of others.



Our awareness of our potential for physical afflictions, our own fragility as humans, and moreover our impending death have hopefully become heightened this past year and a half due to the pandemic. I am curious, however, if we have truly become better followers of Christ as a result. From what I have seen, heard and read, it appears that nothing has really changed regarding the deepening of our faith and, worse yet, more people have drifted further away from the Church, become more divided and consequently more isolated. "Social distancing" has become part of our new lexicon and this is unfortunate: God created us in community for union with Him and one another - and rather than love and compassion, we have allowed fear and anger to keep us apart.

Many of our beloved parish members remain afraid or reluctant to return to Church and receive the Holy Eucharist: We must pray for, reach out to and extend a personal invitation – with love and not judgment - for these brothers and sisters to return to the true sanctuary for our minds, bodies and souls. We have loved ones and friends who are in hospitals or nursing homes: We must not forget them, or remain content with calling them – rather, we must go visit and pray with and encourage them in person. We must stop feeding into the "great social divide" which is continuously propagated by the devil: We must avoid buying into the unholy trend of unfriending or canceling out others, and instead we must love, pray for and reach out to all especially those who are not like-minded - in the Name of Jesus Christ, and for His glory! Indeed, if the Holy Apostles only preached to and taught those who thought like them, the Gospel would have never been spread!

When we were stripped, beat up and left for dead by the evil one outside of Paradise, our Lord - the True Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37) - had compassion on us, took upon Himself the wounds of our sins on the Cross, granted us new Life by His Resurrection, and brought us into His Church in order to care for us, spiritually, physically and emotionally until He returns again in glory. Our loving God has said, "Fear not, for I am with you" (Isaiah 41:10) - and, in the wise words of St. Paul, "If God is for us, who is against us?" (Romans 8:31) Let us then begin a "better normal" today, and from this time forth let us never cease coming together and serving one another, in imitation of the love of Christ our God, from Whom nothing will be able to separate us. (Romans 8:39)





Parish Council Report

Las Vegas

As we head into the summer months, it is great to be able to once again enjoy ourselves as we did pre-pandemic, both in our personal and spiritual lives. What a great feeling of optimism as we go forward in getting completely back to normal.

In conjunction with this great feeling of optimism, we are definitely proceeding with the 2021 Greek Food Festival. The dates again are Friday, September 10 through Sunday,

September 12. We have been in the planning process for months, and our mission is to provide a very "high energy" and "festive" event with our keystone being "kefi." As has been stated repeatedly over the years, the Festival is the primary showcase of our Church and Greek Culture to the Las Vegas area. Of great significance, many people have joined our Church through continued catechism after having attended the Festival and Church Tours. Our Festival is a monumental undertaking which takes months and months of planning, coordination and the involvement of our entire Church Community. Also, as stated through the years, it is extremely important and vital to our Church Community as one of the major sources of revenue for

our Church capital and operating accounts. Needless to say, it is crucial for the

Church's financial support and future viability.

The Festival will probably be one of the first events of its kind postpandemic, and we strongly believe that we will do very well this year. However, as we put the Festival together, we still need to recognize that there will be other alternatives in town. Thus, it is incumbent upon us to continue creating new attractions and experiences, while at the same time, offering our guests the total "Greek Experience" filled with high quality food and drink, high quality music, and Greek hospitality replete with courteous service.

Putting on the Festival requires an aggressive effort toward pre-sales, which include Raffle Tickets, Coupon Books, Souvenir Magazine Ads and

Vendor leasing. These pre-sales provide "seed" money for the Festival. This is extremely important because we have many necessary expenditures prior to the Festival, and this seed money makes the entire Festival self -sustaining without putting any strain on Church finances. Additionally, on the first day of the Festival we need to have approximately \$40,000 in cash on hand to fund the "bank," which allows us to fill the cash drawers at each booth. More importantly, good strong pre-sales could conceivably fund up to 35% or more of the nut going in. The stronger the pre-sales, the lower the risk for us in the case of inclement weather or other intangibles. It is our goal to reach \$200,000 with pre-sales. We can realistically get there prior to the Festival by selling at least 700 Raffle Tickets (\$70,000), \$25,000 in Coupon Books, \$70,000 in Souvenir Magazine Ad sales and \$35,000 in Vendor leasing sales. These are our goals and it takes everyone working on it together to realize them.

We are going to have our first Festival meeting after Church services on Sunday, June 27, at noon, in Kokkos Hall. We invite everyone to attend to learn more about what we are doing. We also welcome any suggestions to make the Festival better. Hopefully, we will see you there.

Switching gears, we have written and spoken about Stewardship for many years. Stewardship is the lifeblood of our Church, and it is imperative that we all work together on this vitally important aspect of our Church. One of the primary purposes of Stewardship is to promote spiritual growth and strengthen our Faith. It not only provides for our place of Worship, our Clergy and our Ministries, but it also provides for the future of our Church by bringing and keeping our youth in the Faith. By strengthening our Stewardship program, we can move forward with a vision for the future. The Greek Orthodox Faith is one of the oldest, one of the most beautiful, and one of the most respected religions in the world. A Greek Orthodox Altar sits upon the actual site of Jesus' Crucifixion, which is located inside the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. The Tomb where Jesus was Buried and Resurrected, which is also located in the Holy Sepulcher, is protected by Greek Orthodox Monks. In Bethlehem, a Greek Orthodox Church is the entry point into and the main structure of the Church of the Nativity, and the Church's Altar is situated directly above the Grotto of the Nativity, the place where Jesus was Born. Although we live and worship in Las Vegas in our beautiful Church, let us never forget that we are part of the universal Orthodox Church spread throughout the whole world. (Continued on Page 6)

To make Stewardship successful requires each and every one of us to look into our hearts and give back to the Church for the gifts God has bestowed upon us all, and to look to the future of our Church for ourselves and our children. Fixing the Church facilities remains a high priority. We have completed the repairs on the small stucco pony wall surrounding the Dome on top of the Church along with a waterproof cap on top of it; hopefully there will no longer be any leaks in the Church (if we ever have rain again). We are presently engaged now in fixing the small dome situated on the roof above the Church Administration Offices: The wood beams supporting it are starting to rot and in the near future, the dome could conceivably end up in Father John's Office. We are getting bids and will start the repair work on it soon. We are also going to look at resurfacing and fixing the floor in Panos Hall, and are in the process of getting bids on it as well. It is absolutely critical that we do so for the purposes of renting it out for various events. As stated last month, there are many other issues pertaining to the facilities that we will need to work on in the near future, and which we will need to prioritize in the coming months.

In closing, we want to again thank the various Church ministries and organizations, and the many individuals for all the work they do. It clearly takes a lot of work from the entire community to maintain our Church. Please step forward whenever you can and pitch in. Please get involved as we move forward to make our Church better. Greetings from the Bookstore! New to the Bookstore from Anaphora Press (and perhaps a great summer read!), *Two Tales of One City* by Zenovia Kotsonis. *Two Tales* is an engaging story about Saint Xenia of Petersburg and her life and influence on those around her at the time as well as throughout the course of history in Russia and the Soviet Union. The story alternates between 1963 Leningrad and 1727 St. Petersburg where Saint Xenia lived and transformed her life in Christ, even becoming a "fool for Christ," having permanently donned her late husband's military uniform to become one with his identity



toward the endeavor of his salvation along with that of her own. She would wander the streets of St. Petersburg, sleep and pray in open fields, and ultimately become known as bearing the gift of clairvoyance.

From an online book review: "Set in Russia, this revolving story follows the lives of two fascinating women and how they intersect across more than a century. Physician Lena, newly engaged, is impassioned by her work helping to heal during the Communist era, but finds herself plagued by unanswered questions. When her fiancée' is assigned an old chapel as his artist workspace, Lena is reintroduced to a historical figure, St. Xenia, whom she considers a part of Russia's obsolete past. Lena is both surprised and troubled by the pilgrims and devotees to this mysterious saint who continue to gather and pray at her shrine, even after all these years and all the education that should have eradicated the old superstitious ways of thinking. Lena wanders through her own discovery of faith as the story of Xenia also unfolds through the chapters. While learning the amazing lengths to which St. Xenia went in honor of her deceased husband, and the miracles left in her wake which Lena cannot explain away with her training in science, it is ultimately a relationship with one of the believers that brings Lena's own story full circle. This tale of faith developing even through adversity is based in historical research. The fictionalized characters help bring St. Xenia alive anew. Her clarion call to believe and to follow Christ echoes through these lives and pages, bringing illumination to Russia's darkest period spiritually. Ms. Kotsonis has given us a memorable and uplifting story. May St. Xenia bless it with her prayers."



Stewardship and Community Outreach

Summer is hot in Las Vegas, especially when the A/C is off. It is hot inside the house, it is hot outside of the house; however, nothing is hotter than the inside of our cars – yowzers – talk about your chariots of fire! The Church is quite wise to celebrate *St. Elias the Prophet's feast day on July 20*. Of course, many other feast days are celebrated in the summer. Those in August include the *Holy Transfiguration (August 6)*, *Dormition of the Theotokos (August 15)*, and Beheading of St. John the Baptist (August 29). It is fitting that the Ecclesiastical Year winds down with a glimpse of the glory to come through a life in Christ juxtaposed with the inevitable death of us all, even the saintliest among us.

As it turns out, the wisdom of the Church is evident not just during a long hot summer but throughout the entire year as well, if one but chooses to contemplate such things. Weekly cycles, seasonal cycles, and an annual cycle are repeatedly interwoven into a beautiful tapestry of holy instruction in Life (with a capital L). We need the repetition to drive home lessons which we should already know and already do. Unfortunately, this is often fruitless since we live in a fallen world and, as weak humans, we are forever stuck in a perpetual loop of: a) stumbling and falling, b) rising and repenting, and c) trying to do better. Thus, despite the constant reinforcement we inevitably fail, week after week, season after season, and year after year. I often wonder if God grows weary with this endless iteration but then realize with relief that He has infinite patience with our fallen human nature. Otherwise, the Lord might have long ago gone blue in the face instructing us in the Way, and I have yet to see an icon like *that* . . . then again, Divinity is universally depicted in iconography by the color blue.

These long hot days have been called the dog days of summer, named such by ancient Romans, who observed Sirius, the Dog Star, rising and setting with the Sun. The days usually had hot and sultry weather which led to periods of stagnation. As good stewards, it is important for us not to stagnate during these hot summer months. Perhaps this year, even with resumed travels or otherwise busy summer schedules, we will take the time to sneak in some additional prayers, not just for the A/C, but for one another and for the Church. We can try to stay a bit more connected to God's Word, a bit more committed to God's Plan, and a bit more current in our Stewardship offerings.

From Father Seraphim

Perhaps the most powerful prayer I have ever encountered is that of the "Canon of Repentance to the Most Holy Theotokos" written by St. Theodore the Studite. The lines of this prayer read like a story, and they tell of a man who is calling out to the Mother of God, asking her to pray for Christ to forgive him. Throughout the prayer, the Panagia comes before her Son, and tells Him to give this man another chance, while Christ replies with lines such as: "Sensibly, O Mother, I call out to you also to hear me now: he who of old lived prodigally with most fervent repentance returned and came crying, 'I have sinned.' But this man calling to you in remorse later proves himself as false." At first, reading these dialogues is difficult. We are confronted with the reality that Christ is God and Judge, versus the modern view of Christ as "friend" which tends to always infiltrate our mindset. As Father, He both chastises and has infinite mercy, and His Mother both shelters and immeasurably defends us. This is the subject of this month's contemplation: The pure and Ever-Virgin Mary.



We know that she is Jesus Christ's mother. She carried the Son of God in her womb and nursed Him from her breasts. She both taught

Christ our Savior to walk, and watched Him walk up the hill of Golgotha. She brought Him water as He crafted wood as a carpenter in His youth, and stood at His feet as He declared His thirst nailed upon the wood of the Cross. Yes, we know she is God's Mother, but have we fully understood that she is ours? When St. John the Apostle wrote that at the Cross stood "the beloved disciple," (John 19:25-27) he was both disguising his own identity and at the same time identifying himself with all of "Christ's beloved." He knew that when Christ spoke from the Cross, "behold your mother," He was speaking not only to John back then in 33 AD but also to us today in 2021. She is our Mother. Christ has offered her to us, just as the Father has adopted us as His Children, and confirmed this in teaching us to pray with the words, "Our Father who art in heaven . . ." (Matthew 6:9-13)

What does this mean though, that Panagia is our Mother? Well – setting aside situations of lost and damaged mothers – it means that she is an amplified version of what most mothers are. They are our realities and memories of what compassion and softness are. They are our sources of comfort when hurt, and our defense against the strong hand of our fathers' anger. As we make our way through the "Canon of Repentance to the Most Holy Theotokos" we can come to see ourselves running to the Mother of God, knowing she will enfold us in her arms, and hug us tight despite the terrible wrongs we have done. Truly, and honestly, we run to her for protection from our God, knowing that we are truly worthy of punishment for our many sins.

Yet, our mind stops often in its logic, and asks, "How can the Mother of God be such a source of mercy over our Lord and Savior?" And to this I respond, "Don't let the Mother of God be the stumbling block, for the stumbling block is the humility and Cross of Christ." She is our sweet, and most generous Mother. She is the one who cares if we run out of wine at a wedding feast *(John 2:1-12)* and she is the one who knows the pains of motherhood. She is our perfect Mother, who lives through our beautiful biological mother or lives on for us despite our broken and lost biological mothers.

Turn to her, who so gently and powerfully loves us. She who is "Quick to Hear" is waiting for our voice to cry out to her. She is the "Axion Estin" – the one it is proper and right to bless with hymns of praise – waiting to bless us. She is the "Joy of All Who Sorrow," fully aware of all our pain. Let us renew or make a new beginning in our relationship with the Mother of God, and just as we would NEVER miss the funeral of our own earthly mother, let us *never again* miss the Dormition of our Mother in August. Just as we would never not attend the festival of our earthly mother's birthday, let us also never again miss the Nativity of the Theotokos in September. (Continued on Page 11)


