
From Father John

Beloved in Christ:

By God's grace, I will turn sixty-five this month. Even if I wanted to keep this under wraps, it is impossible, given that I continuously receive a barrage of unsolicited mail regarding Medicare, supplemental plans, retirement seminars, financial planning for seniors, etc.: It is out there that I am soon to become part of the societal sector defined as – using the term we used in

my teenage years – "old fogeys"! While I readily accept there is no going backwards, nor is that my desire, I do not feel anywhere near retirement – and although I have changed physically and in terms of perspective compared to my youth and middle aged years, I have more desire than ever to do the work God called me to do decades ago.

I have been inspired and guided by the life and words of St. Paul throughout my priestly ministry, and more so this month because this Holy Apostle was sixty-five when he wrote his last epistle in the year 67 AD to his beloved coworker in the Lord, Timothy. "I thank God Whom I serve with a clear conscience, as did my fathers, when I remember you constantly in my prayers." St. Paul continued, "I am reminded of your sincere faith . . . Hence I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of hands; for God did not give us a spirit of timidity but a spirit of power and love and self-control." (2 Timothy 1:3, 5-7)



Serving as a Parish Priest has its challenges, but as St. Paul wrote to the Apostle Timothy (among the Seventy), and as I have lovingly been reminded by my Hierarchs and Confessors through the years, we received all we needed for our Priestly ministry on our day of Ordination – namely, the Grace of the Holy Spirit. Therefore, St. Paul's words, echoed in those who guided and continue to guide me, remain always relevant: "Be strong in grace that is in Christ Jesus." (2 Timothy 2:1) The wisdom of years has taught me the unfruitfulness of hastily rushing to conclusions, taking sides, or being swayed by sensationalistic politics and controversies: "No soldier gets entangled in civilian pursuits since his aim is to satisfy the One Who enlisted him." (2 Timothy 2:4) Admittedly, there are times I fall short, but the wisdom that goes along with getting older teaches me to quickly repent, get back on track, ask for forgiveness, and remember the Lord's purpose for me.

We live in stressful times as foretold by the Holy Apostle Paul: "For men will be lovers of self, lovers of money, proud, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, inhuman, implacable, slanderers, treacherous, reckless, swollen with conceit, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God, holding the form of religion but denying the power of it." (2 Timothy 3:2-4) All the more reason that I do not foresee retirement from the service to which He called me: I will serve in whatever capacity the Lord calls me for as long as He allows. Christ said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few" (Matthew 9:37) – and the Lord's words are still relevant in our times, as we who serve in His Vineyard are undoubtedly aware, regardless of how long we have been in the ministry.

Although the Apostle Paul suffered much persecution in spreading the Gospel of our Crucified and Resurrected Jesus Christ, his love for our Lord and his desire to grow the Church never waned. Moreover, he was a source encouragement to his coworkers who were also suffering much: "As for you, always be steady, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." (2 Timothy 4:5) St. Paul's sixty-fifth year would also be his last year of life before his martyrdom in Rome, but he remained steadfast in fulfilling his holy vocation until the end: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept

the faith." (2 Timothy 4:7) My prayer is that my conviction – and that of my beloved coworkers – in serving Christ and His Church may remain steadfast until the Lord calls us from this life.



Building and Maintenance Committee

Greetings and Happy Fall!

As my term on the Parish Council is coming to an end, it is important to share with all of you the amazing work that we have been able to accomplish because of your generous donations toward the Building Fund. Without your continued support we would not be able to do what we have over the past two years. You will find a spreadsheet *on Page 9*, detailing many of the important projects that we have completed and their cost. In the past 22 months we have paid over \$400,000 toward deferred maintenance projects, with over \$233,000 coming from monies raised and donated within the past two years!

On this spreadsheet you will also see future projects that we would like to undertake and bid amounts that have already been received. I would say in order of priority, our Hall Building is in desperate need of stucco repair and repainting, with aging air conditioning units soon needing replacement. Bids for exterior repainting and stucco are coming in around \$130,000, with 7.5-ton ac units ranging from \$17-23,000 each. Currently, our power bills for the Church and Hall are \$7,300 a month! Our new Church units are expected to arrive in the next few weeks, and this will hopefully help lower our electric bill.


For years we have been stating that \$45,000 of the proceeds from the Festival are supposed to go toward maintaining our Church and grounds and to the Building Fund for capital improvements. But as we know, our Stewardship Pledges have never been enough to fund the general operations of our Parish, and the Festival account has evolved into an overdraw protection account when our expenses exceed our income from Stewardship, trays and candles.

It goes without saying that maintaining our buildings and grounds is a costly and constant responsibility with unexpected repairs occurring all the time. Just this past week, we had to jet out cleanouts (sewer lines) because of backflow flooding, costing \$4,100. The walk-in refrigerator went out and our water bill was \$8,300. This is why it is crucial that everyone do what they can toward helping make sure we keep costs down. Whether it be turning off lights, not changing thermostat settings, cleaning up after oneself, volunteering your time; every small effort makes a big difference. I am deeply appreciative for all your assistance and thankful for such wonderful contributions.



From Father Florin

Among the Fathers of the Church lies what I would call a rather mysterious figure: A sixth-century theologian whose name is unknown and who wrote under the pseudonym of Dionysios the Areopagite, whom we commemorate *on October 3.* With this pseudonym he was alluding to a passage of Scripture in the *Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 17,* where St. Luke tells how St. Paul preached in Athens at the Areopagus to an elite group of the important Greek intellectual world. In the end, the majority of his listeners proved not to be interested and went away jeering at him. Yet a few approached St. Paul and opened themselves to the Faith. The Evangelist gives us two names: Dionysios, a member of the Areopagus, and a woman named Damaris.



Five centuries later, an author of many books chose the pseudonym "Dionysios the Areopagite." His intention was to put Greek wisdom at the service of the Gospel, to foster the encounter of Greek culture and intelligence with the proclamation of Christ. He wanted to do what this Dionysios had intended, that is, to make Greek thought converge with St. Paul's proclamation; being a Greek, he wanted to become a disciple of St. Paul, hence a disciple of Christ.

Why did he hide his name and choose this pseudonym? It seems he desired to make an act of humility. He did not want to glorify his own name: Rather than building a monument to himself with his work, he truly served the Gospel through his ecclesial theology. We can place his theology in the sixth century because the of Greek spirit that he encountered in the books of Proclus, who died in Athens in 485, which he placed at the service of the Gospel.

Proclus belonged to late Platonism, a current of thought which had transformed Plato's philosophy into a sort of religion. Proclus was demonstrating a great cosmic system of divinity, of mysterious forces, through which, in this deified cosmos, man could find access to the divinity. As can be seen, this thought is profoundly anti-Christian. It is a late reaction to the triumph of Christianity, an anti-Christian use of Plato, whereas a Christian interpretation of the great philosopher was already in course.

It is interesting that Pseudo-Dionysios dared to avail himself of this very thought to demonstrate the truth of Christ; to transform this polytheistic universe into a cosmos created by God, into the harmony of God's cosmos, where every force is in praise of God: From the Seraphim to the Angels and Archangels, to man and to all the creatures which together reflect God's beauty. He thus transformed the polytheistic image into a praise of the Creator and His creature. In this way we can discover the essential characteristics of his thought: First and foremost, it is cosmic praise. Since the creature is in praise of God, Pseudo-Dionysios' theology became a liturgical theology: God is found above all in praising Him, not only in reflection. Moreover, the liturgy is not something made by us, something invented to have a religious experience for a certain period; rather, it is singing with the choir of creatures and entering into cosmic reality itself. In this very way the liturgy becomes expansive and great, it becomes our union with the language of all creatures.

Although Pseudo-Dionysios' theology is cosmic, ecclesial, and liturgical, it is also profoundly personal. He created the first great mystical theology. With him the word "mystic" becomes more personal and more intimate, for it expresses the soul's journey toward God. And how can God be found? Here we note once again an important element in his dialogue between Greek philosophy and Christianity. Apparently what Plato says and what the great philosophy on God says is far loftier, far truer. The Bible appears somewhat simple – but he remarks that this is necessary, so that in this way we can understand that the loftiest concepts on God never reach His true grandeur: They always fall short of it. In fact, these images enable us to understand that God is above every concept; in the simplicity of the images, we find more truth than in great concepts. The Face of God is our inability to express truly what He is. So, St. Dionysios uses a "negative theology". It is easier for us to say what God is not rather than to say what He truly is. Only through these images can we intuit His true Face, and this Face of God is very concrete: It is Jesus Christ.




Orthodox Bookstore



St. Dionysios shows us that on our journey toward God we are still very far from Him. In the end, the journey to God is God Himself, Who makes Himself close to us in Jesus Christ. Thus, a great and mysterious theology also becomes very concrete, both in the interpretation of the liturgy and in the discourse on Jesus Christ. With all this, St. Dionysios the Areopagite exerted a strong influence on all medieval theology and on all mystical theology.

In the end, he tells us to take the path of experience, the humble experience of faith, every day. Then the heart is enlarged and can see and illumine reason so that it perceives God's beauty. Let us pray to the Lord to help us to place the wisdom of our day at the service of the Gospel, discovering ever anew the beauty of faith, the encounter with God in Christ.

Stewardship and Community Outreach

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Glory be to God for all things. What an incredible sight we had during our recently completed 50th Las Vegas Greek Food Festival. It was wonderful seeing so many of our parishioners share their unique talents and to offer their time on this important annual event in our Parish. May it be blessed.

As we all know, Stewardship is like a three-legged stool, time, talents, and treasures, and all three legs of this stool must be working for carrying out the mission given to us by our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, Baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirt, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." (Matt 28:19-20)

There are many examples throughout the Bible, of Saints and other people who have dedicated their lives to carrying out this great commission of the Lord. One such example is St. Theophanes the Confessor, who possessed a mind illumined by the light of Christ, even as a child. Once, while walking along the street in very cold weather, he saw a naked child freezing. He quickly removed his clothes, clothed the child, and thus warmed him and brought him back to life. He then returned home naked. His startled parents asked him, "Where are your clothes?" To this the Saint replied, "I clothed Christ." St. Theophanes clearly understood the Lord's message: "In as much as you have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, you have done it unto Me." (Matthew 25:40)

Another marvelous example is St. John the Almsgiver, who was the Patriarch of Alexandria in the 7th Century. Those who knew him spoke of his great compassion for the needy. He would never think of ignoring a beggar, a prisoner, or any afflicted person that he met in the street. As often as he gave, though, he never seemed to run out of resources for the work of the Church. God abundantly blessed him in every conceivable way because of his charity to others.

After his enthronement, he called in the treasurers and financial administrators of the Patriarchate, and told them, "Go, therefore, through the whole city, and make a list of all my masters down to the last." They were puzzled by his request, so he said to them, "Those whom you call poor and beggars, these I proclaim my masters and helpers. For they, and they only, are really able to help us and bestow upon us the Kingdom of Heaven." Once this task was accomplished, he instructed his private treasurer to set aside a daily sum sufficient for the needs of these poor; there were more than seven thousand of them.

One last example is that of St. Martin of Tours. As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in

Amiens, France where he was serving in the Roman army. The beggar was unclothed, asking alms, and was very cold. Others passed the beggar by as if he did not exist. However, Martin, having nothing else to give removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave one half to the beggar and dressed himself in the other half. That night, Martin had a vision in which the Lord Jesus Christ appeared to him. The vision spoke to him, "Martin, a mere catechumen has clothed Me."

May we all remember that the Lord has granted us so many gifts, be they our time in this temporal life, our individual talents, and the financial means he has provided us. May we use these gifts



wisely being seen by Him as Good Samaritans. The Holy Fathers of the Church remind us that God accounts the value of our giving back of time, talents, and treasures, not by how much is given, but by how much is kept back. May we all freely give back to the Lord what is needed for the poor, the sick, and the suffering and do all for His Glory. Glory be to God. $\Delta \acute{o} \xi \alpha \Sigma o \circ \Theta \epsilon \acute{o} \varsigma$.



Dear Father John, Father Florin and Beloved Fellow Parishioners:

With every good intention this letter is intended to refresh the memory of our community and/or familiarize those of us who may be unaware of the history of the *Hellenic Historical Society*.

In 2003, at the Parish Assembly of that year, the *Hellenic Historical Society* (HHS) was established. From that time through 2009 a concentrated effort was made by our archivists to systematically collect and preserve the first 50 years of history of our St. John the Baptist Church Community and the Greek Community at large in Las Vegas and Nevada. This monumental undertaking guaranteed that our history has not been lost.

In 2009 our community was able to enjoy the fruits of that labor at the 50th Anniversary Celebration. During the 3-day celebration of *Our Golden Heritage*, 740 chronologically ordered display boards with a program guide, presenting approximately 7,500 documents, letters, charters, books, photos, newspaper clippings, invitations, etc. were mounted on the walls of Panos Hall and on the walls of the foyer.

In 2019 at the 2-day 60th Anniversary Celebration of our community, *Our Diamond Jubilee*, we were able to further enjoy the fruits of that initial labor in addition to 50 new display boards. These displays were reproduced and those interested can find five large albums in the Church Library.

Please remember how valuable and interesting our story has been. Too many of us do not know of the events that led us to this magnificent Church where we are today. There are many gaps in the history which we would like to fill. To further preserve a more inclusive and detailed history we are asking the Parish Council, the Ministries and Pan Orthodox organizations to select a member of their body to act as historian to gather past, present and future records and to share these documents with the Hellenic Historical Society.

We welcome any and all submissions from any member of the community who has material pertinent to the St. John the Baptist Church Community and the Greek Community at large in Las Vegas and Nevada.

We look forward to receiving your historical materials. Please see the guidelines for your submissions.
