From Father John

Beloved in Christ:


Over a year ago the decision was made to stop watering our grassy Church field. Because of the COVID pandemic our Church services were closed to the

public – available only through live-stream – and with that, we anticipated our revenue would be down during the busiest time of the liturgical year. When it came to cutting expenses, our Church leadership agreed that the expansive lawn was the obvious sacrifice, as there would be no Agape Picnic, no ministries, no Greek Food Festival and, essentially, no valid reason to pay a huge monthly water bill for something that would not be utilized.

The grass on the huge field, once a large expanse of green that could even be enjoyed from a jet window on its ascent from McCarran Airport, quickly turned into an unsightly mass of dead brown with an abundance of weeds. This was not only a reflection of our frugality in the face of a deathly pandemic and its

devastating financial implications, but moreover an icon of what had occurred in our Church worldwide due to the restrictions that kept our faithful from worshiping in person during the holiest season of the year. One year later, by the grace of God, the restrictions have been exponentially lifted – even to the point where we are no longer required to remain socially distant, although face masks are still mandated for our health and safety – and many more have chosen to be vaccinated. To add to this good news, in preparation for Holy Pascha 2021, our Church field has been reseeded and is once again the pleasant lush green lawn we were accustomed to for so many years.

Our Church field is vibrant again, but can we honestly say this about the state of our souls? As we were kept from the Divine services and the Holy Mysteries for an extended period in 2020, over time this has led to the hearts of many of our faithful becoming spiritually unfertile, overly concerned with worldly cares, fearful about death, even disengaged from our live-stream services, choked with the weeds of justifications and excuses, and lacking in the spiritual nourishment offered by our rich Orthodox Tradition. In the process, some have become entirely disconnected from the Church, with little or no desire to return to in-person worship and our community life for the foreseeable future. To be fair, many of our Parish members and catechumens have remained faithful in coming back to Church, and moreover during this Lenten season: But given our growing population, we are nowhere near where we should be – and, more importantly, where God wills us to be!

During His Passion, our Lord Jesus Christ prayed to His Father before the Disciples, "I do not pray for these only, but also for those who believe in Me through their word, that they may all be one; even as You, Father, are in Me, and I in You, that they also may be in Us, so that the world may believe that You have sent Me." (John 17:20-21) Father Barnabas Powell, our guest presenter at the recent Metropolis Clergy Laity Conference, emphasized that in order to move beyond the pandemic and return to worship, we must be mindful that GOD CREATED US TO BE TOGETHER! Jesus set the bar of unity high: Our unity as Orthodox Christians must reflect the unity of the Holy Trinity. Moreover, through our worship and Holy Mysteries, the Orthodox Faith creates the atmosphere where this unity can exist. Prior to the pandemic, our Church was battling secular conflicts, including living/working in a 24/7 city and kid's sports, that made it difficult for many to join us for our Sunday Divine Liturgy: With the added obstacle of this pandemic, along with directives to "stay apart," we have allowed (even if unintentionally) our unity to be severed. Beloved, if we are not gathering in our Church and uniting ourselves to Christ through in-person worship and the Eucharist, then how are we fulfilling our Lord's will that we be one in Him?

Just as our Church field has been regenerated in time for the Great Feast of our Lord's Resurrection, we too must do what is necessary to allow for our renewed connection to Christ, His Church and one another. Just as our lawn has been given new life through reseeding, fertilization and much needed watering, we disciples of our Risen Savior must take heed to and actively respond with full hearts to these words of the Paschal Canon: *Come, let us partake of a new drink: Not one miraculously brought forth from barren rock, but a spring of immortality, welling up from Christ's tomb, from which we draw strength.*"

Parish Council Report

Greetings to all of our Saint John the Baptist Family and *Kali Anastasi*! I pray this message finds you all in good health! As we are now into Holy Week, I am sure that you will agree that this holiest of seasons in our Church carries an extra special significance this year. As the lyrics to a popular song from the 60s told us, "You don't know what you've got 'til it's gone" – and how true this was a year ago! Who can forget live-streaming the Holy Friday

services last year and watching Fathers John and Seraphim proceed around an empty Church with the Epitaphios Icon on their shoulders? Or on Holy Saturday to witness the glory of the Resurrection, again, to an empty Church. While we are blessed to have the technology and thankful for the volunteers who provided it to us, namely Bill and Erin Bruninga, the Likourinou Family and others, the glory of our services is meant to be experienced in person and, God willing, we will soon celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior together, as it was meant to be.

This was the main theme of the Metropolis of San Francisco Clergy Laity Congress, which was recently held online and which I had the privilege to represent Saint John the Baptist as a delegate. Specifically, the presentation on the first day was entitled **Moving Beyond the Pandemic and Returning to Worship**. Father Barnabas Powell of Saints Nicholas, Raphael and Irene Greek Orthodox Church in Cumming, GA (Metropolis of Atlanta) led an enlightening discussion on this subject, and Metropolitan Gerasimos carried the theme over on the second day, and the consensus was clear: The Sacraments of our Church are truly life-giving and holy – meant to be experienced together and not experienced digitally from afar, and we are well on our way to normalcy.

During the past month, we have followed the guidelines of both our Metropolis and State and have expanded our Church's in-person Worship capacity to 50%. We commend our parishioners who have used their good judgment in maintaining distance and safety protocols with the expanded capacity. As I am sure everyone is aware, the State will relax its social distancing rules on May 1 and capacity should be unrestricted as of June 1. If you still have a fear of crowds or are in a high risk demographic, by all means reach out to our priests for counsel and encouragement, and continue to worship in the limited way provided via live-streaming. But for the rest of us, what a wonderful time to return to our Church during the holiest of weeks. Please remain diligent as our ministries will begin to open up as well!

On Pascha Sunday, May 2, we will renew the decades old tradition of our Agape Picnic. The Agape Vespers will be held in the Church at noon, with the declaration of the Resurrection in so many languages, and the Picnic will begin right afterward on our beautiful grounds. Please join us for a lamb or chicken dinner with sides for the family-friendly price of \$20. There will be a bar with refreshments and the Ladies Philoptchos will be selling pastries as well as holding the Wine Wagon Raffle. We pray for great weather and look forward to seeing you all on Easter Sunday.

In addition to the core subjects covered at the Clergy Laity Congress, another agenda item was to nominate two members to the Metropolis Audit Committee, and I am pleased to inform you that our own John Karas was elected to one of these positions. As you might know, John has served many terms on our Parish Audit Committee and chairs the Finance Committee. He has been working with the Metropolis on our Parish's behalf and was instrumental in applying for the Paycheck Protection Program on our behalf, which was extremely important in keeping our Parish solvent during the last year. We congratulate John and are certain that he will do a great job for the Metropolis.

Finally, while Stewardship is discussed in a separate column, I must take the opportunity to once again reiterate that the number of Stewards and pledge amounts are down compared to last year, while expenses, specifically maintenance costs, continue to rise. So as we approach Holy Week, I implore you to pledge if you have not done so, to send in your pledges, and if you can, to raise your level of giving.

From Father Seraphim

Christ is Risen!

This month is especially bright this year as the entire period of May will be filled with the Light of Christ's Resurrection. If we think back to last Pascha every single one us will pause and give most sincere thanks to the All-Merciful Lord for the blessing and privilege of being <u>inside</u> our beloved Church, able to proclaim the Joy of the Risen Lord with a full and double fervor – soberly aware and cognizant of our inability to do so last year in 2020. This month I want to explore a particular prophecy of Jesus concerning His Death and Resurrection, as recorded in the Gospel of Matthew and having to do with the Prophet Jonah. The only "sign" which Jesus promised to give to those asking for signs and wonders as tests of His veracity as the Messiah was the "Sign of Jonah."



The 8th Just who was Jonah? Century BC righteous preacher of repentance to the Ninevites is most famous for his refusal to initially obey God and go to Nineveh, his sojourn in the belly of a great sea monster (Greek ketos) after being thrown overboard from a boat and swallowed, his prayer and three day sojourn in the depths, and his subsequent repentance, regurgitation on dry land, and Nineveh's salvation. The prophet Jonah is commemorated in the Orthodox Church on September 21 and was the son of Amittai (referenced only in *2 Samuel* The Typikon, or order of the *14:25*). services in the Orthodox Church, calls for the entire book of Jonah in the Old

Testament to be read on *Great and Holy Saturday*. This is the very day that Christ is "swallowed by death" – that voracious ancient enemy of the human race – and descends into the "maw of Hades," corresponding to how Jonah descended within the sea beast into the depths of the sea and, *"Cried out to God from the depths of Hades." (Jonah 2:2)* This links Jonah specifically as a "type" or foreshadowing of Christ Who descends into death like some great beast; He then plunders Hades and emerges unscathed just as Jonah was deposited on dry land.

St. Gregory of Nyssa – one of the Three Cappadocian Fathers who expounded the Orthodox doctrine of The Holy Trinity in the 4th Century – put forth the persuasive teaching that death's "swallowing" of the flesh of Christ was really a trick by the Son of God in exploiting the voracious and never-satisfied eater of our human nature. In his <u>Catechetical Discourse</u> St. Gregory (who was also the younger brother of St. Basil the Great) writes, "Since it was not in the nature of the opposing power to undergo the unveiled manifestation of God, the deity was hidden under the veil of our nature, so that, as with ravenous fish, the hook of the deity might be gulped down along with the bait of the flesh. In this way, he who practiced deception receives the very same in return. He who first deceived humanity by the bait of sensual pleasure is himself deceived by the presence of the human form. And whereas the enemy wrought his deception for the ruin of our nature, the wise one used His plan of deception for salvation." This "deceiving of the deceiver" allows Hades and Death to be personified and having greedily "gulped down" the Body of Jesus like the entire human race before Him as the "ancient leviathan" (*Psalm 74:14; Isaiah 27:1*); the end result is that now they have a sort of terrible indigestion and must disgorge not only Christ – Whom they cannot contain – but all those prisoners who were waiting for the Messiah to save them! The hymns of Holy Saturday, the day on which Christ "rests" in the tomb while His soul descends in the "harrowing of Hades," pick up this theme as Christ's Resurrection images Jonah's own vomiting out of the belly of the great sea creature: "Today, Hades groans and cries out, "My power has been swallowed up; the Shepherd has been crucified; and He raised Adam. I have been deprived of those, over whom I ruled; and I have thrown up all those, whom I had swallowed when I was strong. He Who was crucified has emptied the tombs. The power of death is no longer in force." Glory to Your Cross and Your Resurrection, O Lord!" (7th Idiomelon – Vesperal Divine Liturgy of Holy Saturday) Another spiritual link that connects Jonah in the belly of the great fish to Christ is recorded in one of the published Poems of St. Gregory the Theologian. According to St. Gregory, when Jonah cried to God from within the belly of the



ketos he did so with his arms extended outward making the form of the Cross with his body: "O Christ my King, when Jonah opened wide his arms in prayer in the monsters' entrails he was delivered by Your power from the whale." This foreshadowing is taken up in many other hymns sung on Jonah's feast day and the Feast of the Elevation of the Holy Cross *(September 14)* and eventuates in Jonah being spewed forth and saved. Because Jonah prayed "in the form of the Cross" he is even more closely identified with Christ on the Cross.

Christ Himself spoke the first words of *Psalm 22* from the Cross and continued to recite the Psalms in order right up to the moment He said, *"Into Thy hands I commend My spirit." (Psalm 31:5)* Just a few verses into Psalm 22 – which is a blow by blow recounting of Christ's Crucifixion from the perspective of the One hanging on the Cross – we hear the prophecy of David now on the Messiah's own lips, *"I am a worm and not a man." (Psalm 22:6)* Like a "worm" writhing on the "hook of the Cross" the King is enthroned, turning His ultimate humiliation into the moment of His triumph and glory. In the very moment of His greatest "weakness" Christ enticed and tricked our ancient enemy in a mystery hidden before the ages: *"Which none of the rulers of this age knew; for had they known, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory." (I Corinthians 2:8)* St. Gregory of Nyssa again comments on the relationship of the devil, or death to "swallowing" and being "hooked" in another treatise called <u>On the Three-Day Period between the Death and Resurrection of Christ</u>: "For this reason, having swallowed the bait of the flesh, He was pierced with the fishhook of deity, and so the dragon was caught with the fishhook, just as it is said in the book of Job, 'You shall catch the dragon with a fishhook.' (Job 40:25)" This is how, "Having disarmed principalities and powers, Christ made a public spectacle of them, triumphing over them in the Cross." (Colossians 2:15)

Christ crucified is the Wisdom of God and the Power of God. He Who is greater in Wisdom than Solomon, "the wisest of all the kings of the earth" (1 Kings 4:30), overturned the power of "the dragon the old serpent, which is the devil and Satan." (Revelation 20:2) For in the words of St. Paul, "The foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men." (1 Corinthians 1:25) The humble obedience of Christ, "unto death, even death on a Cross" (Philippians 2:8), is more powerful than our ancient enemy: "The devil who prowls around like a roaring lion (or a great hungry fish!) looking for someone to devour." (1 Peter 5:8)

May we also be obedient to our Risen Savior and His life-saving commandments so that we will not be handed over as food to death, but like Jonah, and moreover our Lord Jesus Christ, we will also be partakers of the Resurrection, receiving our final salvation from the realm of Hades and the Devil. May we forever be with Christ in the love of His Father and the Communion of the Holy Spirit!



Orthodox Bookstore

Greetings from the Bookstore! Christos Anesti!

One of the most popular sayings of St. Seraphim of Sarov regarding the spiritual life was that, "The goal of the Christian life is the acquisition of the Holy Spirit." We all know that it was the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost that established the Church as the Body of Christ and thus the striving in all of us toward our own personal Pentecost, so to speak, as Orthodox Christians fully immersed in Christ's Mystical Body over a lifetime. Since we are moving forward to the Feast of Pentecost over the next fifty days and the celebration of the Holy Spirit, this month's featured selection is *The Joy of the Holy: Saint Seraphim of Sarov and Orthodox Spiritual Life* by Harry Boosalis. Boosalis is a graduate of Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Brookline, Massachusetts – the Seminary that our Parish supports annually. Dr. Boosalis currently serves as Professor of Dogmatic Theology at St. Tikhon's Orthodox Seminary in South Canaan, Pennsylvania.

In 1990, the relics of Saint Seraphim (born Prokhor Moshnin on July 19, 1759 in Kursk, Russia) were discovered in the basement of a former Kazan Cathedral that had been converted into a Museum of Atheism by the Soviets. A renewed interest in him was thus "sweeping the Russian nation, and indeed the entire Orthodox Christian world," and marked a "growing sense of awareness and appreciation of the rich spiritual heritage of the Orthodox Church." (*Boosalis, 1993*) Moreover, according to Boosalis, "The attraction of his teaching lies in the very practical way he presents the heights of Orthodox Christian spiritual life as being open and accessible to all. Whatever one's status in life or position within the Church, every faithful member of the Body of Christ possesses the same potential for acquiring the grace of the Holy Spirit. This is the same

grace of the same Holy Spirit who has been saving and sanctifying the saints throughout the centuries, up to this very day. St. Seraphim of Sarov is noted for the distinct character of his message, which is especially relevant to the needs of contemporary man . . . and is living proof that modern man can indeed acquire the same fullness of grace of the Holy Spirit which has manifested itself throughout the history of the Orthodox Church."

The Joy of the Holy captures the life of Saint Seraphim, his message, the well-known mystical event of "The Conversation" with his friend and lifelong disciple, Nicholas Motovilov, about truly experiencing the grace of the Holy Spirit, the role of *ascesis*, and of course the inner life of prayer. Lastly, some of his spiritual instructions are provided to the faithful on God, Faith, Spiritual Peace, Patience and Humility, culminating in Prayer and the Church.

From the Spiritual Instructions on the Peace of the Soul: "This peace, which our Lord Jesus Christ gave to His disciples before His death, is like no other treasure on earth, for as He said, 'Peace I leave with you, My peace I give unto you.' (John 14:27) Likewise, the Apostle said, 'The peace of God, which passes all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Jesus

Christ. Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord.' (Philippians 4:7; Hebrews 12:14) Therefore, in order to receive the peace of God, we must concentrate all of our thoughts, desires and actions and ceaselessly cry together with the Church: 'O Lord our God, grant us peace!' (Psalms 77:4)"
