From Father John Beloved in Christ:

A few thousand pilgrims boarded the Diamond Princess Cruise Ship last month to explore the wonders of Japan and Southeast Asia, only to be quarantined for two weeks and, on top of all that, exposed to the deadly coronavirus. As I write this the number of people continuing to die in China from this new epidemic is frightening – exceeding 2,000 – and more

and more people are testing positive for this virus, even outside the plagued city of Wuhan: Just try going to your local drug store here in Las Vegas and you will find that face masks are selling out even in our country!

If coronavirus is the epidemic of this new decade, we must keep in mind that each previous decade has had a unique deadly affliction to combat: Yet with that said, there is one disease that has persisted in spreading from the time of Adam and Eve's expulsion from Paradise – namely, the epidemic of sin, which has caused catastrophic sickness, suffering and death for the entire human race. As we Orthodox Christians will universally chant on the Sunday of Forgiveness, "Come, my wretched soul, and weep today over your acts, remembering how once you were stripped naked in Eden and cast out from delight and unending joy." (Troparion, Orthros, Sunday of Forgiveness) Like Adam and Eve – and yes, the Prodigal Son – each of us must begin the Forty Day Fast of Great Lent soberly mindful that every human being has transgressed the will of God . . . lived selfishly and continued breaking His commandments . . . and thus has been plagued with sin and consequently exists in the "far country" away from His Kingdom.

On Monday, March 2, we will embark on our voyage over the Great Sea of the Fast, and for six weeks we will be encouraged to "love abstinence, that we may not weep as (Adam) did outside Paradise, but may enter through the gate." (Kathisma, Sunday of Forgiveness) Our Orthodox Christian Faith prescribes each of us to fully partake of "the season of the virtues" through fasting, prayer, repentance and the giving of alms – that our awareness of our spiritually diseased condition might be heightened, and thus we may be emboldened to look to Jesus Christ as our strength, our God and Lord, and our only Redeemer through His Life-giving Crucifixion and Resurrection. "O Master, Guide to wisdom, Giver of prudent counsel, Instructor of the foolish and Champion of the poor, make firm my heart and grant it understanding. O Word of the Father, give me words, for see, I shall not stop my lips from crying out to You: I am fallen, in Your compassion have mercy on me." (Kontakion, Sunday of Forgiveness)

During the Holy Fast, we will be instructed to abstain from meat and dairy products – but this must go hand in hand with our effort to abstain from sin, in our thoughts, words and actions. Through the increased number of Lenten services, we will be given more opportunities as we fast to feast upon the spiritually beneficial hymns, prayers and scriptural readings – as well as the precious Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ in the weekly Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts. We will be invited to conduct an assessment of our souls and to come to the Sacrament of Holy Confession, so that we can be purged of the many sins that afflict us – and granted through God's absolution a new and pure garment for our soul, mind and body. Through the disciplines of daily prayer and repentance, we will hopefully become mindful that sin and suffering – and spiritual death – is a *shared condition* . . . and so we will be deeply moved to stop judging and condemning our brothers and sisters, and moreover be stirred to show mercy through continuous forgiveness as well as by giving alms to those in need.

May we have a blessed and fruitful Lenten journey so that we might be God-pleasing partakers of our Savior's glorious Resurrection!





Stewardship and Community Outreach

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Glory be to God for all things. As we are beginning Great Lent, let us take a moment to reflect on the incredible gift our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ has granted us. He became incarnate for one purpose: That He might "be about His Father's business" (Luke 2:49), which was to die on the Cross to fulfill God's plan of salvation; to open up a pathway for all of us, who seek it, to His Heavenly Kingdom. As St. John wrote in his Gospel, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16)

Jesus did not come as a conquering King riding on a chariot with an army of heavenly hosts to establish an earthly kingdom, but rather He rode on a donkey. (John 12:12-16) He came as a simple, poor and humble man to show us the right way to turn back to Him and the Father. He came as a servant. He served the needs of many by cleansing lepers (Matthew 8:1-4, Mark 1:40-42, Luke 5:12-16), giving sight to the blind (Mark 8:22-25, Mark 10:46-52, John 9:1-7), hearing to the deaf (Mark 7:33-35), healing physical maladies (Matthew 12:15, Luke 4:40, Mark 6:56), casting out evil spirits (Matthew 8:28-34, Luke 4:33-36 and 8:27-33), and raising the dead (Luke 7:11-15, Luke 8:41-56, John 11:38-44).



On the very night He was betrayed by Judas Iscariot, He lowered Himself to the level of a slave and servant by washing the feet of His disciples. (John 13:3-11) After doing so, our Lord said to them "If I, then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you should do as I have done to you." (John 13:13-45) The Lord showed His disciples – and us – to be servants of one another and to care for each other.

After Pentecost, and with the growth of the Church, the Apostles soon realized that they could not be all things to all people. As such, they ordained seven deacons to handle the matters of caring for those "neglected in the daily distribution." (Acts 6:1) Eventually, they ordained Bishops, Priests, and Deacons in the areas they evangelized. Yet even these ordained ministers of the Word and the Holy Mysteries could not do it all themselves: They depended on the members of the Church, all who were given spiritual gifts by the Holy Spirit to be used to serve others in their communities. "And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers for the

equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for edifying the body of Christ." (Ephesians 4:11-12) "As each one has received a gift, minister it to one another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." (1 Peter 4:10)

Are we, as members of the Body of Christ, offering up our time and talents to support our Parish and the holy full-time work of our Priests? Or are we taking the approach to let someone else take care of the day-to-day operations of our Church – which oft times falls upon our Priests.

Let us use this Lenten season to *renew our commitment* to give back a portion of our time and talents to God's glory and the building up of His Church.

From Father Seraphim

You scaled the mountain of Godly virtue to raise up a great and sacred ladder on which we ascend from this fallen state; and leaving the passions beneath, we rise step by step unto the vision of God and the life on high. Thus, O righteous Father John, as our God-appointed guide, entreat the Lord to grant great mercy unto us.

(Hymn for St. John of the Ladder)

Our Holy Father, Saint John Climacos loved God from his youth, took up the sweet yoke of monastic life, and through it came to divine vision and was deified. Being united to the living God, he shares in His uncreated glory and energies and is shown forth as a teacher and father, not for his own time only, but for all centuries until the consummation of time. This Holy Father, Saint John of the Ladder ($\kappa\lambda i\mu\alpha\xi$ in Greek), lived and struggled for a whole lifetime on the God-trodden Mountain of Sinai, having entered the monastic

struggles in his teens. For forty years he lived as a hermit at Thola, about five miles from the monastery (now known as St. Catherine's) and later he became the abbot of Sinai. At that time, the monastery erected by the Emperor Justinian in the 6th century was already in existence and still stands intact to this day. It was built at the site of the Burning Bush and dedicated to the Transfiguration of our Lord. St. John lived to the age of eighty, and reposed in the Lord in the year 603.

It was during the time that he was abbot that St. John wrote, among other things, *The Ladder of Divine Ascent*, from which his name is derived. In this God-inspired book, he has written observations and teachings which are taken from his long experience as an ascetic struggler against the passions. It is composed of thirty steps, and each step deals with a certain virtue or sinful passion, informing us from where it originates and the different paths it takes in our experiences. In each step or *logos* (as the steps were originally called in the manuscripts where they were presented as



words of instruction) deep insights are revealed about our fallen nature, our captivity therein, and a way to freedom in Christ. This work is so greatly esteemed by the Church that its author is celebrated twice in the liturgical year: On the day of his repose, March 30, on the Fourth Sunday of Lent.

In all of the Orthodox Church's monastic communities throughout the world, the *Ladder* is read in the refectory during the common meal for the entirety of Lent. Thus, the natural setting in which millions of Christians have encountered this work throughout the centuries is in the context of strict fasting, of prostrations, of contrite prayers, when only one meal is partaken of throughout the day – and that after the ninth hour (3:00 pm). Being read therefore during the meals in this period of fasting and struggles, it makes a profound impression on its hearers. And this is exactly how such texts should be read if they are to bear any fruit in us – not in spaciousness and comfort, not sitting in arm chairs, eating snacks and sipping soft drinks, but rather with prayers and fasting, and with prostrations and repentance. It is truly a book to awaken us, to call us to spiritual action, and must be read with discernment and humility. We can derive immense benefit and increase our love for Christ in the reading and putting into practice of many things in this deep and lofty text, but we do not need to go live in a cave in the desert to do so.

During this holiest of seasons, let us read the Scriptures and God-inspired books of the Church with reverence, fasting and prayer. Let us especially put into practice, those things which we read: "Let us try to learn divine truth more by toil and sweat than by mere word, for at the time of our departure it is not words but deeds that will have to be shown." (Step 26:36) This Lent, if we even take a single step up *The Ladder*, we will find that we have already left the earth behind in our ascent toward the love of God.





Greetings and Blessed Lent from the Bookstore!

This month, as we enter into the Lenten Season, we are featuring *The Spiritual Life and How to Be Attuned to It*, written by Saint Theophan the Recluse.

Our Father among the Saints, Saint Theophan (1815-1894) was Bishop of Tambov in Russia. His thirst for complete union with God led him to reclusion, but he did not deprive the world of his rare gift of combining Patristic expertise with his deep understanding of the souls of contemporary people. The Saint received 20-40 letters per day, and answered each one.

The Spiritual Life and How to Be Attuned to It is a collection of letters that Saint Theophan wrote in correspondence with a young woman from Moscow, who was struggling with spiritual difficulties. The book is the saint's spiritual advice in letters. The reader can feel the young woman's struggles, and with each successive letter, comprehend her progress.


"Once, in the middle of the dance floor at some annual ball, a young lady had a sudden glimpse of the immortality of her soul; and as this vision flashed upon her

inward eye, she was struck with the thought that all this swirling around the dance floor was utterly futile. Amazed and disturbed, she wrote to the recluse: "Is this normal, or is it a morbid hindrance to a desire for a happy life in the world?"

The answer to her question evoked a correspondence which resulted in this volume. The saint writes: "When writing to you, I had nothing in mind other than to set you on the way of the true Christian life..."

The letters read like they were written with us in mind today. In the introduction of the book, Protopriest Milos M. Vesin of Lansing, Illinois said, "The need for such a book in our time is truly great." Saint Theophan's other titles that are available in the Bookstore are: *The Path to Salvation*; Raising them Right; Kindling the Divine Spark; Turning the Heart to God; and Unseen Warfare.


