From Father John

Beloved in Christ:

Christ is Born! Glorify Him! As we enter the New Year during "the twelve days of Christmas," it is fitting that we continue in the joy of the life-changing event of the Birth in the Flesh of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. My earnest prayer is that we begin 2022 by thanking God for our


abundant blessings from the depths of our souls – despite these challenging times. These holy days should awaken us to the truth that our Lord came into the world at a time when people sat in darkness, to grant hope and life to us all: Knowing that with God all things are possible, let us allow His loving and merciful Presence to be the Source of our peace, our confidence, our faith, our unity, our restoration, and our life. As the Birth of Christ allows for our union with God, may we cooperate with His grace and *do our part as His instruments* in ending the fear, divisiveness, and insanity we have increasingly experienced and witnessed in the world.



The twelve-day celebration culminates with the *Great Feast of Holy Theophany on January 6*, which commemorates the Baptism of our Lord in the Jordan River at the hands of St. John. How amazing that our Lord condescends to become a Man (while remaining fully God), humbles Himself yet again at the age of thirty to be Baptized by a man, and all with the intent of uniting us humans with Him through the Sacrament of Holy Baptism! In the words of St. Paul, *"For as many of you as were Baptized into Christ have put on Christ." (Galatians 3:27)* As Baptism is the means of our rebirth, the celebration of Holy Theophany becomes the annual renewal of our Baptismal grace – particularly with the *Great Blessing of the Water*, which mirrors the rite of Baptism. For this reason, Theophany is also called "the Feast of Lights," as it spiritually revitalizes each of us who initially received "Illumination" (the deifying Light of God) through Baptism.

St. Basil the Great, whom the Orthodox Church commemorates *on January I*, describes in the fifteenth chapter of his classic theological treatise, *On the Holy Spirit*, just how Baptism fulfills Jesus' words (*John 3:5*) about being born again in the water and the Spirit: "Our Lord made a covenant with us through Baptism in order to give us eternal life. There is in Baptism an image both of death and of life, the water being the symbol of death, the Spirit giving the pledge of life.

"The association of water and the Spirit is explained by the twofold purpose for which Baptism was instituted, namely, to destroy the sin in us so that it could never again give birth to death, and to enable us to live by the Spirit and so win the reward of holiness. The water into which the body enters as into a tomb symbolizes death; the Spirit instills into us his life-giving power, awakening our souls from the death of sin to the life that they had in the beginning. This then is what it means to be born again of water and the Spirit: We die in the water, and we come to life again through the Spirit.



"To signify this death and to enlighten the Baptized by transmitting to them knowledge of God, the great Sacrament of Baptism is administered by means of a triple immersion and the invocation of each of the three Divine Persons. Whatever grace there is in the water comes not from its own nature but from the presence of the Spirit, since Baptism is not a cleansing of the body, but a pledge made to God from a clear conscience.

"As a preparation for our life after the resurrection, our Lord tells us in the Gospel how we should live here and now. He teaches us to be peaceable, long-suffering, undefiled by desire for pleasure, and detached from worldly wealth. In this way we can achieve, by our own free choice, the kind of life that will be natural in the world to come.

"Through the Holy Spirit we are restored to Paradise, we ascend to the Kingdom of Heaven, and we are reinstated as adopted sons. Thanks to the Spirit we obtain the right to call God our Father, we become sharers in the grace of Christ, we are called children of light, and we share in everlasting glory."

Beloved, may we all eagerly partake of the water of regeneration on Holy Theophany, paving the way for us to *"walk as children of light" (Ephesians 5:8)* throughout the New Year – through an active prayer and Sacramental life in Christ's Holy Church.

Parish Council Report

Καλά Χριστούγεννα και Ευτυχισμένος ο Καινούριος Χρόνος! Ι wish everyone a Blessed Christmas and a great New Year.

This will be my final column as President of the Parish Council. It has been a great run these past six years. I sincerely enjoyed my service and am proud of what we accomplished. I want to thank everyone who has contributed so much to the success of our Parish over these

last six years. Your contributions have been phenomenal. I also want to specifically thank our Clergy. We have been truly blessed with tremendous Clergymen who have given so much of themselves to tend not only to our Parishioners but also to many, many others throughout the Community.

We had our ups and downs over the years, especially with the challenges foisted upon us by the Pandemic; but, through Faith, Hope, Courage and help from God, we overcame the obstacles put before us and were ultimately successful in our endeavors. I can say with confidence that things are certainly looking up as we move forward and can also say our Parish is getting better every day. Although we accomplished much these past six years, there is still much more to do as we continue building for the future and ensuring the viability of our Church. I have taken the liberty to set forth some of my comments to hopefully help provide a framework for building upon what we have all done since the inception of our Church, and to help realize the ultimate goal of building a better future.

Building for the future needs to include continuing to build and improve our Stewardship Program; strengthening the ties we all have to the Church; reaching out to the many people who for one reason or another have become disconnected from the Church and their Faith; promoting our Faith and Culture to the Las Vegas Community; promoting Church social events and Fellowship; and most importantly, engaging and connecting our youth and strengthening their Faith through religious education, the varied ministries and Church activities, dance groups, sports, and various social functions. Doing these things will ensure that our Church will be here for years to come, and then some. The importance of connecting and maintaining the connection our young people already have to the Church cannot be overstated. Over the years, there has been a lot of effort given by many to engage our youth, and it is it has been truly gratifying to see more young people getting involved in all facets of our Church, including leadership roles. We need to continue with and strengthen these efforts.

Building for the future also includes addressing the challenges we are facing with having to fix and upgrade our facilities, as they have aged significantly. As I see it, in the next couple of months, we need to refinish the floors in Panos and Kokkos Halls and paint the interiors. This is a must if we are going to continue using both halls for revenue-generating events. Also, by the end of the year, we need to resurface the parking lots and re-stripe them. This too is a must, not only because the many cracks and faded striping are eyesores, but also because the cracks are growing in width and will eventually become tripping hazards for people walking on the lots, especially during the Festival. In the next year or two, we need to repair the stucco and paint the exteriors of the Church and the Community Center. The stucco on the planter on the south side of the Church is in dire need of being completely redone because it has water damage behind it, which is causing it to buckle and break off. In the next several years, we will have to replace a good portion of our HVAC. We are good for at least two more years, but after that, their operation will become dicey and less than consistent. A few less important items to add to the list of projects that will need to be completed include re-staining the concrete in front of the Church, replacing many of the landscape lights, and refurbishing the fountains. To complete these capital projects is clearly daunting, but with planning, strong Stewardship contributions, donations, successful Festivals, and working together, we can make it happen.

As most of you are aware, we recently held our Parish Council elections. Congratulations to Telly Eliades and Alex Mavros on their reelection to the Council, and congratulations to Alexia Conger, Eleni Filios, John Fotopoulos and Ted Zaferatos on their election to the Council. We wish the new Parish Council the best, and with God's Blessing, we hope they will all do great things for the Church. In addition, we wish to thank Stacy Mavrantonis, Peter Papas and John Matsis, for all their hard work and service to the Church. They will truly be missed, and we fervently hope that they will continue to serve in other capacities. The new Parish Council will take the Oath of Office during the Divine Liturgy *on Sunday, January 9*. Following the Dismissal, the new Parish Council will remain in the Church to elect Officers. *(Continued on Page 5)*



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Ευτυχισμένος ο Καινούριος Χρόνος! Happy New Year!

Yes, another calendar year has arrived, giving us yet one more opportunity to renew ourselves in our Orthodox Faith. A short time ago we celebrated the greatest act of giving, the greatest act of Stewardship, the greatest act of LOVE in the history of the world: The Birth of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ. He came into the world as Man to save mankind by reopening the path to the Father and His Heavenly Kingdom.



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During this first month of the new calendar year, we celebrate two major events in the life of Jesus: On January 1 we commemorate His Circumcision, and on January 6 we celebrate Holy Theophany – His Baptism at the hands of St. John the Baptist, our Parish Patron.

Each step of the way Jesus Christ is fulfilling the Old Testament Law and step-bystep paving the way for our return to His Kingdom, the Heavenly Realm. Of course, we know that this will lead us to His greatest acts

of LOVE: His Passion, Death, Descent into Hades, Resurrection, Ascension into Heaven, and shortly thereafter, Pentecost and the Descent of the Holy Spirit upon His Apostles – the birth of His Church on Earth.

Through each of these events in His life, the Lord Jesus Christ is giving Himself to us, showing us His unconditional LOVE for each one of us. He is giving us His all, His very life, for our salvation: *"Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends." (John 15:13)* In return, *we must give our all back to Him*.

So, how do we LOVE Him, give our all back to Him? How do we show the depth of our faith? Throughout the Gospels He has shown us the

way of LOVE, through giving completely of ourselves back to Him and one another. In the Parable of the Judgment *(Matthew 25:33-40)*, He talks about feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, clothing the naked, taking in strangers, and visiting the sick and those in prison. He concludes with the following, *"inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me."* Elsewhere, Jesus also tells His Disciples and us to *"love one another as I have loved you." (John 15:12)* This last statement by Christ is remarkable because we not only have to love our friends, but – as He has done – we must also unconditionally love those who have caused us great pain, sorrow and suffering. He showed us this when, on

the Cross, He said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do." (Luke 23:34)

May we reflect on the words of St. Nicholas the Wonderworker, Archbishop of Myra in Lycia: "When Christ's Spirit fills the heart of a disciple, we joyously want to imitate our Lord's example by giving all that we have to help others. True joy comes through giving. True meaning in life comes from helping and serving others. And the generosity of our giving reflects the maturity of our faith!"

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,


On behalf of Fr. John, Fr. Seraphim and the Parish Council, we would like to thank you for your ongoing support to our Parish.

From Father Seraphim

Every *January 2* we celebrate the life of St. Seraphim the Wonderworker of Sarov (1754-1833). As a young boy named Prochoros growing up in the city of Kursk in Southwestern Russia, he was the son of merchant class parents. His father Isidore Moshnin built Churches and ran a hardware store of sorts together with his mother, Agathia. They were pious and attended the Divine Services regularly, but young Prochoros was reserved, serious, and did not play too often with the other children of the village – preferring rather to spend long walks in silence in the woods and in prayer. While accompanying his father on a construction site, the future saint was blown by a strong gust of wind off a very high belltower on a Church. Isidore and the workers rushed down expecting to find the mangled corpse falling at such a distance, but Prochoros was unharmed and had been safely carried down by his Guardian Angel. Another miraculous occurrence cemented the providential care of God





over his whole life beginning in childhood: Having fallen quite ill and responding to no treatment, the family had given up hope for recovery for the young boy. Lying on a bed in fever and being unable to get up they awaited his end. A Church procession that was passing through the village with priests and deacons, faithful pilgrims, incense, Crosses and banners, together with a miraculous icon of the Mother of God (The Kursk Root Icon) was diverted during a downpour from the main road into the Moshnin's front yard. Agathia immediately carried her sick and dying son outdoors, and the Icon passed over his body laid out on the ground as a blessing – and after this the boy was straightaway healed and made a full recovery.

At the age of 18, the saint departed his parents' home with their blessing, together with some other monastically inclined friends, and having received a brass Cross from his mother which he wore on his chest for the rest of his life, he set off on the relatively short journey from Kursk for the city of Kiev and the great monastic establishment of

the Kiev Caves Lavra. Once there the young men requested an audience with the great clairvoyant elder Dositheos to get a blessing and guidance. Prochoros and Dositheos spoke a long while. And finally, Dositheos told him, "Go, child of God, to the Monastery of Sarov, and stay there. That place will be to you for salvation. With God's help, there you will finish your human wanderings on earth. Only, struggle to acquire the unceasing remembrance of God. Continuously call upon His Name, saying: 'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner!'" The young monastic aspirant received the advice as the will of God and set off immediately for the Monastery of Sarov, located southeast of Moscow, where he enrolled as a novice.

He was quickly put to work doing all the regular tasks of the difficult monastic way. He chopped wood, tended the garden, worked in the kitchen preparing food and washing dishes, singing in the Monastery choir, and fulfilling his prayer rule in his cell while attending all the Church services lasting eight to ten hours a day depending on the season or festal period. After eight years he was tonsured and given the name Seraphim, meaning "flaming one" from the sixth chapter of Isaiah, where the angelic beings surrounding the throne of God and having six wings in Hebrew are called "burning" – with love for God. Later he was ordained as a deacon and while participating in the Divine Liturgy he fell into ecstasy upon seeing the Living and Risen Christ appear and come out from the icon in the Icon Screen. He was unable to speak for some hours and when he came back to himself, he could not describe in words the joy of the soul in the experience of the vision of God. He was finally ordained as a priest and would serve the Divine Liturgy every day.

After some years in the cenobitic, or communal life of the Monastery, St. Seraphim felt called to further ascetic struggles. He was given the blessing to go into the forest surrounding the monastery and live during the week in a small cabin preserving silence and ceaseless prayer, cultivating a garden, and living in peace with the animals like another Adam in Paradise; he would return to the Monastery for the Divine Services on the weekends. During this time he increased his devotion to God reading the entire New Testament every week. He would sleep and eat very little because that left less time for prayer and the enjoyment of singing the Church services and reading the Scriptures. St. Seraphim befriended a wild grizzly bear he nicknamed Misha, and would name different landscapes around his hermitage places from the Gospels like Golgotha, Mt. Tabor, the Jordan River etc. In this way he always kept his mind focused on God.

He received in all twelve visitations by the Mother of God during his life and had an unceasing devotion to her. He spent three years in absolute silence guarding his tongue and his mind and speaking no words outside the words of the Divine Liturgy. He knelt once for 1,000 days and nights on a rock in the forest, in rain and cold, night and day saying the Jesus Prayer, and asking for God's mercy – waging war on the presence even of one demonic thought within himself. He was thus given by God the grace to work miracles and see into the hearts and minds of men. St. Seraphim suffered much at the hands of robbers who beat him half to death and broke his spine permanently, causing him to be bent over and walk with a cane or stick to lean on the rest of his life. Yet again, the Mother of God healed St. Seraphim and later commanded him to open the doors of his cell in the Monastery, which he moved back into, to all the people who would come to him to be healed, to confess their sins, and to receive a word of salvation.


St. Seraphim had the discernment to say to people, "Whatever I say to you is from the Holy Spirit. If the Holy Spirit does not tell me anything to say to you, I will not speak." After many decades of fasting, prayer, disciplining his body, Church services, fighting the devil and his passions, and suffering for the sake of Christ, St. Seraphim became a source of guidance, miracles, and comfort for the whole Russian land. Czars, generals, businessmen,

mothers, peasants, and people of all ages, professions, and walks of life journeyed to Sarov to encounter God in the face of His Saint. He reposed on his knees with his candles burning and the Gospel book opened having said: "When I am dead, come to me at my grave, and the more often the better. Whatever is in your soul, whatever may have happened to you, come to me as when I was alive and kneeling on the ground, cast all your bitterness upon my grave. Tell me everything and I shall listen to you, and all the bitterness will fly away from you. And as you spoke to me when I was alive, do so now. For I am living and I shall be forever."

When I read the life of this holy man when I was 16 years old my life changed, and I fell in love with both St. Seraphim and the Orthodox Church. I pray that in this New Year we all can take the time to attentively read one full length book of a Saint's life and perhaps fall more in love once again with our Holy Orthodox Faith and our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ.




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Orthodox Bookstore

Greetings from the Bookstore! God is revealed!

This month's featured selection, *Remember Thy First Love*, by Archimandrite Zacharias Zachariou focuses on the three stages of Christian spiritual life as conveyed by the recently canonized St. Sophrony of Essex (November 27, 2019), whose spiritual father was St. Silouan the Athonite.

Remembering one's first love is a difficult thing with the growing chaos and confusion in the world and the idea was stating that it was better to walk alone with God than to walk with a multitude who are without God. The latter walk was deemed easiest to do in a world increasing in its mockery of those presumed to be clinging to old "superstitions" as opposed to the realities of science and all things visible, earthly, or material. The former walk, under such challenging circumstances would likely need some encouragement, or more specifically, a "remembrance of thy first love" to power forward.


From Remember Thy First Love:

"Continually and from all eternity, God waits patiently at the door of man's heart, and when He finds a tiny opening, namely, a little humility and gratitude, He enters in, and of course, when He does, He makes a feast with man. The *Book of Revelation* calls this first visit of God our 'first love.' This is the beginning of our walk with God, and we must always be mindful of walking worthily. The Lord says to the Angel of the Church at Ephesus: 'I have this against you, that you have abandoned the love you had at first. Remember then from what you have fallen, repent and do the works you did at first. If not, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place, unless you repent.' (Revelation 2:4-5)

"Indeed the early Church had known this great love, this first visitation of grace in all its depth. But evidently, owing to persecution and various other difficulties, the initial fervor had weakened. One way of rekindling our relationship with the Lord is to remember His first visitation. Father Sophrony loved this passage and would often say, 'Remember thy first love.'" (p. 107)

It is difficult enough in the toughest of times to remember or rekindle this first grace, but St. Sophrony is not stopping there at the first rung on the ladder, so to speak. He takes us on a progressive journey of the spiritual life to its ultimate conclusion, our final adoption as children, by which we become heirs of God and joint-heirs of Christ *(Romans 8:17)*. St. Sophrony began this journey himself when over time, "Little by little it dawned on him that pure intellection, an activity of the brain only, could not advance one very far in the search for reality." *Remember Thy First Love* attempts to explain what is meant by this, and how it is fulfilled in our lives in Christ here in the Church.
