Beloved in Christ:

During this month of Thanksgiving, please be assured that *"I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy..." (Philippians 1:3-4)* I am equally grateful to Jesus Christ our God for granting us many opportunities in November, on Sundays and weekdays, to partake of His precious and Life-giving Body and Blood in the Divine Liturgy. Finally, I am thankful for the many of you who have faithfully and patiently prepared during this pandemic to finally be received into the Holy Orthodox Church through Baptism and Chrismation: Just witnessing the long line of newly illumined members of the Body of Christ approaching the Holy Chalice brings great joy to my heart, giving me more reason to thank God!



On November 8 we commemorate the Synaxis of the Archangels Michael and Gabriel, as well as all the Heavenly Bodiless Powers that surround the Throne of God, ceaselessly glorifying the Holy Trinity. Most of us are ever mindful of the two leading Archangels, Michael and Gabriel, because we see their holy icons on every Iconostasis in every Orthodox Church, usually on the Deacon's doors: We know Michael as the Captain of the Heavenly Hosts who will usher in the Second Coming of Christ, and Gabriel as the Messenger of our salvation, having brought the good tidings to the Virgin Mary of the Incarnation of our Lord.

Of all the ranks of Angels, the one most personally connected to each of us is our Guardian Angel, who was granted to us by prayer on the day of our Baptism: *"Wed him (her) in life to a radiant Angel, to safeguard him (her) from every plot of the adversary, from every evil encounter, from destruction that wastes at noonday and from evil visions."* How often we remember our Guardian Angel when we get in a vehicle – be it an automobile, jet or ship – and pray for protection, yet we forget that the real intent of our Angel is to pilot us safely toward the Heavenly harbor of our true salvation! So integral is our Angel to our spiritual life and growth, that in every Orthodox Service, including the Divine Liturgy, the priest prays this petition: *"For an angel of peace, a faithful guide, a guardian of our souls and bodies, let us ask the Lord."* There is a need for this petition to our merciful God, because we are so often mindless of the continual 24/7 labor of our Guardian Angel for our growth in virtue and the salvation of our souls, and heedless to his ongoing task of keeping us from participating in evil and sin.

Our Guardian Angel's work is surely daunting, given our inclination to misuse or abuse our God-given free will. Moreover, our Angel is absolutely selfless and driven by holy love, for he does not give up on us even as we regularly offend him and undermine all his efforts on our behalf. Our Angel takes his task most seriously, knowing that this earthly life is all he is granted to guide our conscience toward repentance and to encourage within our hearts a genuine desire for union with God. Our Angel is acutely aware of Christ's sober teaching in His Parable of the Rich Man and Lazaros, which illustrates the role that Angels have in carrying our souls into the Kingdom before they punch out their time card: Our Guardians know that this life is our only chance to change our godless ways, for *"a great chasm has been fixed"* between Heaven and Hell. (Luke 16:19-31) Like our loving Creator, Who entrusted our Guardian Angel to each of us, our lifelong bodiless partner's only longing is for us to be granted citizenship eternally in God's Kingdom.

As we take the time to pray to the Trinitarian God, seeking the intercessions of the Holy Theotokos and our Patron Saint, let us also offer the following prayer to our Guardian Angel: *Holy Angel, attendant on my wretched soul and my afflicted life, forsake me not, as sinner, nor depart from me because of my lack of self-control. Give no place to the wicked demon to dominate me through prevailing over this mortal body of mine. Hold my wretched and feeble hand, and lead me on the way of salvation. Yes, O holy Angel of God, the guardian and protector of my wretched soul and body, forgive me everything that I have done to trouble you all the days of my life, and if I have sinned in anything today. Shelter me tonight, and preserve me from every prank of the enemy, that I not anger God by any sin. And intercede with the Lord on my behalf, that He strengthen me in the fear of Him, and that He make me a worthy servant of His goodness. Amen. (Translated by Hieromonk Seraphim Dedes)*

Parish Council Report

We want to again thank everyone who has worked so hard and contributed so much of their time, talents and treasures to keep our Church going during these most difficult of times. We urge each and every one of you who have the means, to continue contributing to help provide for and maintain the future of our Church.

As many of you already know, the limit for the amount of people allowed to attend Church has been recently increased from 50 to 250 Parishioners. This is great news for all us because it affords us more opportunity to worship in our Faith. It also means that reservations for seating in the Church are no longer required. However, even with the limit being raised to 250 Parishioners, we are still required to maintain the appropriate social distancing pursuant to CDC and State guidelines for COVID as well as our Parish Reopening Plan. This means that we will only be able to seat around 150 people at a time in the Church. We still have seating in Panos Hall, where we have been live-feeding Church Services onto a large video screen. We can seat up to 250 in Panos Hall for Services. As we have been doing, Holy Communion will also be offered in Panos Hall during the Liturgy. Please note that pursuant to the COVID guidelines, everyone still needs to continue wearing masks which cover their noses and mouths, unless a specific medical condition makes it untenable to do so.



Please note again that we will continue live-streaming our Sunday Church Services, which we are doing through YouTube. To access the live-stream please go to <http://youtube.com/vegasgreekorthodox>. Again we would like to thank Bill and Erin Bruninga, Skip Ruffner, and Steve and Juliana Likourinou for making this happen.

We have a Parish Assembly for Parishioners in Good Standing scheduled for *Sunday, November 22, following the Liturgy*, in Panos Hall. We will have the room arranged with seating that complies with social distancing requirements. Parish Assemblies are extremely important for the Church, and we urge everyone to attend to learn about the future direction of the Church, participate in approving the annual budget for 2021, nominate Parishioners for election to the Parish Council, learn about the external and internal audits of the Church finances, and other issues affecting our Church. Please be there. On another note, we are looking at the possibility of having some capability to allow a limited number of Parishioners to attend via Zoom (video) Conferencing. If we are able to accomplish this, it will be limited in its application. We will keep you informed.

Elections to the Parish Council are scheduled for *Sunday, December 6*, following the Liturgy until 3:00 pm. Pursuant to the Uniform Parish Regulations, and the Parish Bylaws, you must vote in person. Voting by Absentee Ballots is allowed, but the ballots must be received by the Church Office no later than *Friday, December 4* at 5:00 pm. No proxy ballots are allowed. Again, please note that in conducting the voting, and as mandated by the Metropolis, we need to comply with COVID guidelines, which includes social distancing while standing in line, and wearing masks covering noses and mouths.

We are still looking at the weekend of *May 14 through 16, 2021* as the dates for the Greek Food Festival. September of 2021 will still be our fallback date. As previously stated, we should be in better position in December of this year to make a final decision as to the new dates. Hopefully, with a lot of prayer, it will take place in May. On another note, we respectfully request that any monies you would have expended this year at and for the Festival, be donated to the Church operating account. Every single offering helps immensely in meeting our obligations.

As we prepare to go into 2021 with the uncertainty of COVID, and its devastating impact on all of our lives, we must still go forward with optimism and the strong belief that we will overcome, and things will absolutely be better. This past year with all the tumult, we have all learned of the importance of our Faith in God, and of our Church, and the need to still look to the future of our Church with a positive vision that will continue to provide a religious life for ourselves and more importantly our youth. Such a vision requires Stewardship.

Dear Sisters of Philoptochos and the St. John the Baptist Community,

I greet you with love in the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As the COVID-19 pandemic has affected every aspect of our lives, I pray for all of us to acquire the essence of prudence, humility, patience and love. I offer my heartfelt wish of health, safety and strength.

On behalf of our entire Philoptochos Chapter, I express our deepest condolences to our President Benita Beeman and family for the recent passing of Karl. May God grant your beloved husband and father a place in His Kingdom, where there is no pain, sorrow or suffering. May his memory be eternal.

Our Philoptochos is an exemplary sisterhood and the philanthropic arm of the Greek Orthodox Church. We offer nourishment for the hungry, shelter for the homeless, medical assistance to the infirmed, and friendship to the lonely. Our *Social Services* – being the heart of our philanthropic mission – has made during the past few months the following donations: *\$500 to Serving our Kids Foundation*, to supplement food and personal care items for the weekend bag program for children; *70 activity bags and “treasure chest” toys to UMC Children’s Hospital*, which has been well received as the playroom is closed and visitations limited due to the pandemic; *\$700 to Project 150* (\$500 for food and \$200 for undergarments and hygiene items); *\$500 for meals at the LV Rescue Mission*; *\$1,000 to the Nevada Childhood Cancer Foundation for Camp Cartwheel*, the largest summer camp in the Western US for critically ill children and their siblings – this year the camp was virtual and bags with many items were delivered to the children; and finally, *\$500 to Peggy’s Attic benefitting Child Haven*, specifically for blankets and duffle bags for the children as they transition into Foster Care. Our sincere gratitude to Geri Kypreos, our Social Services Chair, and her committee members, Paraskevi Santamaria and Cheryl Pandelis, for their continuous philanthropic commitment and dedication.

We live in extraordinary times which require extraordinary response. As the need continues to rise, any contributions you can make for any of our very worthwhile programs will bring some comfort and respite to those most vulnerable.

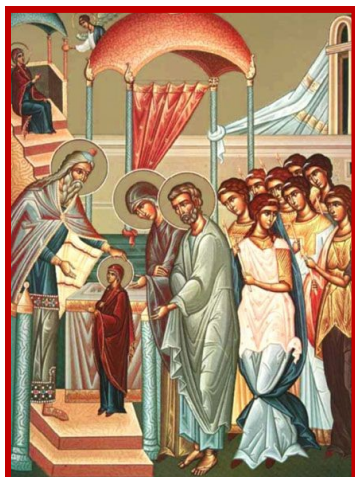

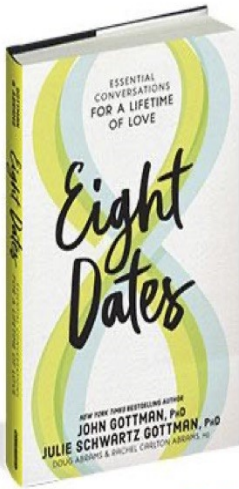

From Father Seraphim

November is a month of many great Saints; however, I would like to share the life of one recently canonized Serbian Saint of whom you probably have never heard. Born in San Francisco during the presidency of Abraham Lincoln, *St. Sebastian Dabovich* has the distinction of being the first person born in America to be ordained as an Orthodox priest, and also the first native born American to be tonsured as an Orthodox Monk. Besides many trips abroad to spread the Gospel, he ceaselessly traveled back and forth across the American continent, using every available mode of transportation – from stagecoach to railroad and on foot.

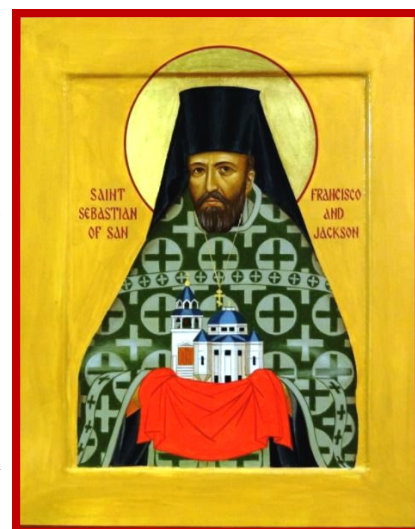
Given the name Jovan at birth (June 21, 1863), St. Sebastian was the fourth of seven children and as a child was part of the Greek-Russian Orthodox community that formed in the San Francisco Bay Area just six years prior to his birth. Although they had no priest, and despite the “gold rush” chaos, the faithful would gather often and especially for all major feasts of the Church. After Alaska became part of the United States in 1872, Bishop John Mitropolsky came to San Francisco and erected the Cathedral of St. Alexander Nevsky, where young St. Sebastian began attending every service. From that young age, it is recorded that he was like a “modern St. Nicholas” in his love and generosity for the poor.

After graduating from high school he was assigned to work in Sitka, Alaska at St. Michael's Cathedral (established by St. Innocent of Alaska). Among the natives in Alaska, St. Sebastian began to discover his evangelical zeal. He and some Orthodox Tlingits (a native Aleut/Eskimo tribe) taught Orthodox Christianity to those in present day Juneau and three years later began the Church of St. Nicholas there: It remains the oldest continuously functioning Church in Alaska! During his stay in Alaska he furthered his theological studies; after traveling to St. Petersburg in Russia, he was tonsured as a monk, ordained as a deacon and given the name Sebastian.

After returning to San Francisco, St. Sebastian served under Bishop Vladimir who became his mentor. He learned from him that “When the Orthodox Faith is brought to a new territories, it must be made available in the local language.” Bishop Vladimir required his priests to learn and serve in English. In fact, St. Sebastian developed the first English translation of the Divine Liturgy in the US. After his ordination to the priesthood, St. Sebastian reported that there were some 1,500 Orthodox Christians residing in California and the Pacific Northwest without Churches or regular access to the Holy Sacraments, and asked to be assigned to minister to these believers. Within a week of being granted his request, he began his travels to as far north as Vancouver and as far south as San Diego, eventually covering 3,000 miles. St. Sebastian spoke tirelessly to countless individuals, making friends on all levels of society, from the common man to the highest strata of American social and political life. He initiated discussions with non-Orthodox churches. Because of these dialogues, some Western Rite parishes were later received into the Orthodox Church.

Although of Serbian descent he knew his task was to minister to all. Fluent in English, Serbian, Russian as well as Greek, he brought back to the Orthodox Faith many immigrants who had come under Protestant, Uniate and Catholic influence, and provided the Sacraments and spiritual guidance for the Russian, Serbian, Bulgarian, Greek, Syrian, or Arab Orthodox Christians he came across. In 1893 St. Sebastian baptized a child in Jackson, CA, and seeing the Christian families there, began the mission parish of St. Sava the Enlightener of Serbia. Today this is the oldest standing Orthodox Church in the Western contiguous United States.

St. Sebastian greatly venerated his holy missionary predecessors. He wrote the first English translation of the life of St. Innocent of Alaska and wrote about St. Herman 72 years before he was formally canonized. In fact, St. Sebastian worked with another apostle and saint, Bishop Tikhon Ballavin, when he was appointed as the only Orthodox Bishop in North America in 1898. During these years together, St. Tikhon raised St. Sebastian to the rank of abbot and then archimandrite.

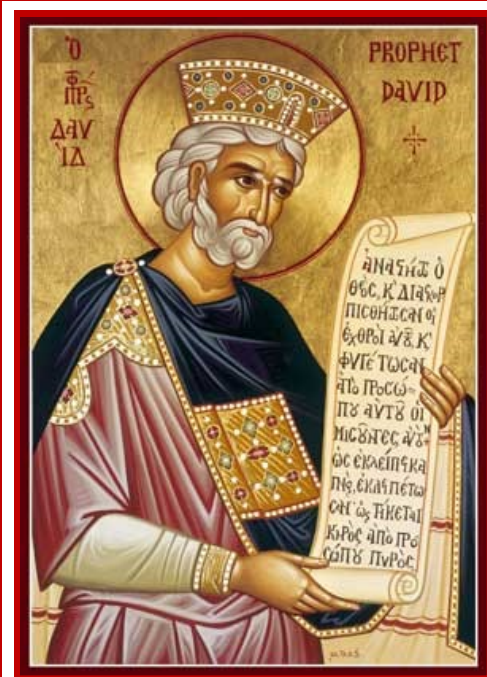
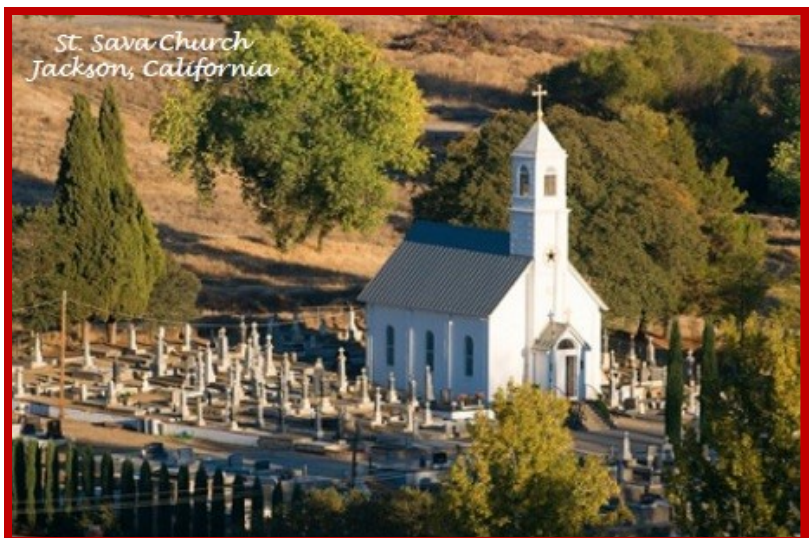
St. Sebastian again asked to go abroad to minister to the people in Europe when World War I began. After the war, while Russian and Serbian tension in the Orthodox Church in America had finally ceased (due to the distractions of the Russian Revolution), the elderly St. Sebastian stayed in Serbia where he reposed on November 30, 1940. At the time of his death he owned nothing but a gold cross, some books, and a few personal mementos. He had long since given away any significant personal possessions to the poor, choosing for himself a life of poverty, simplicity, and missionary service.

Today the holy relics of St. Sebastian can be found in the Serbian Orthodox Church in Jackson, CA. They were brought over from Serbia on September 1, 2007 after many long years of humble obscurity – the majority of St. Sebastian’s apostolic labor took place in America and he was relatively unknown in Serbia, where Communism had taken over just six years after his repose. On September 5, 2015 St. Sebastian was officially canonized and his name was entered into the list of the Righteous Saints, Miracle Workers and God Pleasers of the Holy Orthodox Church. This simple missionary to America who labored so long to bring Orthodoxy to the immigrants and natives of America was called, “A viceless man,” by St. Nikolaj Velimirovic.

I had the great blessing to learn about his life recently and also to venerate his wonderfully fragrant relics in Jackson. If you are ever traveling East of the Bay Area, be sure to contact Father Marko Bojovic (317-490-5379) to schedule a tour and venerate the holy relics of St. Sebastian, who is glorified and living forever in the Kingdom of God and interceding for us as we also strive to live and spread the Orthodox Faith in America.

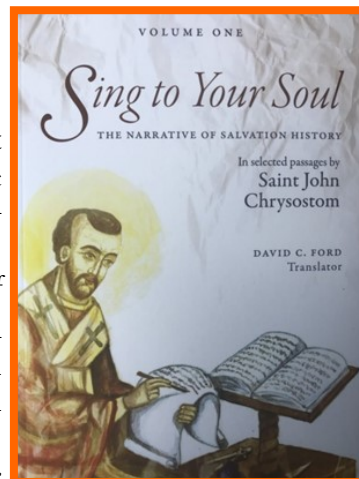

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The Way of the Lord



“Confession must be voluntary and sincere in order for it to be true and effective. A rushed and insincere confession is fruitless, since it is not a revelation of the heart, an expression of deep remorse, and an indication of yearning for treatment.

Confession must be performed without embarrassment and reservation, but with boldness and self-reproach, because boldness is an expression of the abandonment of sin and a disposition to expose sin; bashfulness confirms that there exists a lack of courage.

Confession must be carried out with contrition of heart. This confirms a true change of mind and expresses sorrow for the transgression of God’s commandments, Whom one is seeking to propitiate. Confession without contrition of heart confirms the lack of a deep feeling of guilt for the transgression of the Divine Law.”
