From Father John Beloved in Christ:

As we approach the midpoint of the Great Fast *on Sunday, April 4* – the Third Sunday of Lent – our focus turns toward the triumph and joy of the Holy Cross: During the Doxology the priest processes with the Cross, which is placed on a tray in a mound of flowers, and upon facing the Holy Altar the entire congregation joins him in chanting, "We venerate Your Cross, O

Master, and we glorify Your Holy Resurrection!" The end of our forty day pilgrimage is in sight, and the power of the Holy Cross becomes for us, who are fatigued by our spiritual and physical effort, a source of encouragement: The Gospel reading (Mark 8:34-9:1) and hymns for this day make it clear that the salvation

of the world comes only through the Cross of Christ – and our personal willingness to carry His Cross in our own lives.

During Great and Holy Week, which begins Sunday evening, April 25, we will experience in hymns, readings and liturgical actions, the voluntary Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ. Following our Lord's Last Supper with His Apostles and prior to His arrest, the Son of God prayed these words earnestly to God the Father on the Mount of Olives: "Father, if You are willing, remove this cup from Me; nevertheless not My will, but Yours, be done." (Luke 22:42) While He prayed, as recorded by the Evangelist Luke, "an angel appeared to Him from heaven, strengthening Him." Yet He was still in great agony – to the point where "His sweat became like great drops of blood falling down upon the ground." (Luke 22:43-44)

This Scriptural passage is one of the most perplexing – and similarly, one of the most revelatory – in the New Testament, as we are offered a full glimpse into the mind of Christ, the *Theanthropos* (God-Man). From one angle we see the deep anguish of Jesus in His prayer, a reflection of His Humanity, asking His Father to remove the impending suffering from Him – and moreover, His agony

produces a heavy sweat resembling great drops of blood. From another angle, we witness the full communion of the Divine Son with His Father, submitting His Human will to the Godhead, voluntarily accepting what lies ahead – and His Father immediately sends an angel to strengthen Him.

But, my beloved, let us probe deeper to comprehend the real cause of Christ's agony. St. Cyril of Alexandria invites us as we read this passage to enter the Lord's Mind: "Tell Me, what husbandman, when his vineyard is desert and waste, will feel no anguish for it? What shepherd, when his flock is perishing, suffers nothing on its account? These are the causes of My grief." Our Lord's agony should not be interpreted merely as anxiety or fear about what is going to happen to Him: His anguish is over our sinfulness, our rebelliousness, our heedlessness and our lack of love toward the One Who created us – and, at this crucial juncture, the rejection and hatred of the One Who has come to suffer for us in order to save us.



God's immeasurable love for the world prompted Him to send His Son into the world: After three years of walking, fasting, teaching, healing, casting out demons, performing miracles, thirsting, hungering and weeping, our Lord knelt on the Mount of Olives and His relentless human labors for our sake produced an immense sweat as He prayed. Blessed Theophylact writes: "Those who toil exceedingly 'sweat blood,' and those who lament bitterly 'weep blood.' . . . The Lord was not merely damp, but perspired all around." Even in His hour of agony, our Lord's toil, prayer, sweat and tears were for those whom He loved – those who



received Him and followed Him and, yes, at this hour those who were on their way to arrest Him. Christ's work was and continues to be – now through His Church – for our repentance and, according to His will, our entrance into His Kingdom.

As we join together prayerfully at the divine services of Holy Week, we will see, hear and feel firsthand all that our Lord endured voluntarily for our salvation. May our prayers and participation have the depth and impact that produce the fruits of repentance and love, so that we may – as God truly wills for each of us – willingly take up our Cross daily and thereby become genuine partakers of His Resurrection.

Parish Council Report KALO PASCHA! As we go forward into the Lenten Season, we do so with new hope. With vaccines for COVID starting to come out in droves, and "herd immunity" gaining traction, we should be able to again worship and celebrate our Faith in our Church in the very near future without restriction. As partially set forth in *Ecclesiastes 3:1-22: "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven . . ."* It is now the season and

time to be eagerly optimistic that we will soon be back to normal, and not the "new normal" espoused by so many of those without Faith. Optimism is the foundation of courage and being optimistic just feels better.

Many of you already know the great news, we can now open up our Church to fifty percent capacity; however, in this vein, we still need to be smart about things. This means still wearing a mask, and keeping some modicum of social distancing. Many do not like wearing masks, of which I am one, but it is necessary to do so, especially out of respect for others who are attending or want to attend services. We wear masks in grocery stores, restaurants, gyms, etc., albeit reluctantly, but we still do so out of respect for others and out of respect for the guidelines that have been put in place. The least we can do is to wear them in our Church to give everyone attending a measure of comfort, safety and peace.

Having the ability to have more people in our Church is going to make this year's Lenten Season, Holy Week and Pascha all the more special, especially given that we were unable to celebrate in person last year. Here are the dates: *Palm Sunday is April 25; Holy Week starts that evening and culminates on Pascha, Sunday, May 2, with the Agape Vespers Service starting at noon.* In the past, we have had an overflow tent set outside with a large video screen for people to enjoy the Services. As most of you know, we have been using Panos Hall for the overflow since COVID hit us. Panos Hall will remain open for overflow throughout Holy Week, and Sunday Services. Again, we want to thank Steve Likourinou for making this happen.

We are going to have our *Apape Picnic this year starting immediately following the Vespers Service on Pascha until 3:00 pm.* Holding the Agape Picnic takes on new meaning and importance this year because it will be the first time we will be together in fellowship since COVID shut everything down over a year ago. To celebrate, we are offering a tremendous plate of food for \$20 with your choice of grilled lamb or baked chicken, roasted potatoes or rice pilaf, Greek salad, homemade bread, the traditional red egg (κόκκινα αυγά), and spanokopita or tiropita. There will also be our famous Greek pastries for sale, and homemade tsoureki bread. We will also have an outdoor bar serving beverages. *Our traditional annual Easter Egg Hunt for the kids will start at 2:00 pm.* It is important to call the Church Office to get tickets in advance. We will have a drive-through takeout service for people who cannot attend in person to get a plate of food and pastries to take home: This needs to be ordered in advance. Call the Church Office for details. Please note that there will not be a Palm Sunday Luncheon this year.

Pressing on with optimism, this year's Greek Festival will be held on *Friday, September 10 through Sunday, September 12.* We are very confident that everything will be opened by then and we will be able to hold it. Therefore, we are in the extensive planning stages with the complete mindset of it happening this year. Look for new changes to the Festival with a new theme, new look, and other cool modifications. Even at this early stage, we are very excited about it to say the least, and God willing, we will have a great year.

Our Annual Stewardship Drive is underway and at the risk of sounding like the proverbial broken record, please get behind the effort with your generous and much needed contributions. If there is one thing we learned from everything last year, is that we cannot depend on the Greek Food Festival to cover the shortfalls in the operating expenses of the Church. It has to come from Stewardship, so please look into your hearts and think about giving back for all the blessings you have received. This is about our future and our ability to maintain our Community. Also, please get involved with your time and talents as we move forward to make our Church better.

To keep everyone informed about issues pertaining to the Church facilities, there are several items we are presently addressing. We recently re-seeded and reworked the irrigations systems on the big field and other areas to start getting the grounds back in shape. It is our hope to have the grass growing strong and green by the Agape Picnic, and moreover, by the Festival. We are also in the process of fixing another glitch on the roof of the Church. This last rainfall exposed another leak up around the dome. There is a small stucco pony wall surrounding the dome on top of the Church. The stucco has cracked open due to weather exposure, and is allowing water to leak in. We are working on bids to fix the stucco and put some form of a water proof cap on top of the wall. This was not part of the roofing repair contract from last year. Another thing we absolutely have to address in the next few months is the small dome over the Administration Offices. The wood beams holding it up have started to rot and it is a matter time before the dome ends up in Father John's and Karen's offices! There are still many other issues pertaining to the facilities that we will need to work on in the near future, which we will need to prioritize in the coming months.

In closing, please keep praying for a speedy end to this pandemic that has caused so much suffering and consternation; keep praying for a speedy return to normal; and keep praying for those working on the front lines. We are almost there, so keep the Faith, because Faith and optimism are key to a better future. "Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil." (Ephesians 6:11) Enjoy the Lenten Season and God Bless! Gus Flangas, Parish Council President

Stewardship and Community Outreach

Shortly after the Triodion began, a story ran about a sheep which had been wandering the wilds of Australia, apparently lost for years, as evidenced by his wild and wooly coat which had grown so long, that it impeded the poor creature's movement, grazing, and even vision. In a country renowned for its many dangerous and deadly creatures, it was amazing that a lost domesticated animal could be found alive, let alone restored to the fold after an estimated five years spent in the wilderness. The report I read was filed on February 25 and it is interesting to note that in *Luke 15*, Christ's parable of the lost sheep occurs just a bit before his parable of the Prodigal Son, the Sunday of which fell this year on February 28. Believe what you will, but I think this little miracle was quite a wondrous blessing to contemplate as we headed into the Lenten season.

Concurrent with Lent, baseball's Spring Training is, of course, in full swing. No pun intended. You may well ask how these two could possibly relate so I will try to make a connection by laying out this month's stewardship reflection with the aid of a few quotes from Baseball Hall of Fame member Yogi Berra:

It's déjà vu all over again.

Our Church wisely repeats the many Lenten teachings we tend to forget or neglect during the year, which are beneficial for our souls and salvation. Yearly, weekly, and even daily services are meant to ground us in the basics, build our spiritual muscles through exercise, and reinforce our reliance on all members pulling together toward victory. It certainly seems that the Triodion, Great Lent, and Holy Week can be viewed as our annual Orthodox Spring Training!

The future ain't what it used to be.

The future will not likely be better if everyone just *intends* that it be so. Common wisdom cautions against falling into the trap of day dreaming versus doing: "The road to Hell is paved with good intentions." From St. James, "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves." (James 1:22) And St. Paul, ". . . for not the hearers of the law are just in the sight of God, but the doers of the law will be justified." (Romans 2:13) Repentance, forgiveness, reconciliation, prayer, fasting, almsgiving, and study make up the difficult tasks to do during our Orthodox Spring Training if we are to have a chance at making the playoffs. Let us accomplish these necessary works and finish Lent spiritually stronger, so that we may approach Holy Week with a renewed devotion to engage in our Christian life.

If you don't know where you are going, you might wind up someplace else.

Our Church teaches us lessons throughout every Ecclesiastical Year, all based upon the depth of God's Word. A depth which may be plumbed for a lifetime. Day by day, week by week, and year by year. No matter our propensity to doubt, drift, or even deny, we will always be welcome to return to the fold. Yet, St. John Chrysostom said, "What benefit is it if, while listening each day, we neglect to practice what we hear? Hence, I beseech you, let us be zealous in practicing those very deeds (by no other way, in fact, is it possible to be saved)." So, as we wrap up this Lenten season, let us hear the lessons, apply the lessons, and see their results. Let us continue our fast into the excitement and anticipation of Holy Week. Let us have no doubt we are heading toward the right place, that Feast of Feasts – Holy Pascha.

Getting back to our lost sheep, his story did not end with returning to the fold. No, God used that sheep and those who rescued him to richly illustrate Gospel truths of hundredfold returns on His blessings and the impact of His Works far exceeding human imaginings. Said sheep was sent to a rescue animal farm, whereupon they sheared its massive 77-plus pound fleece, which was then sold in a charity auction for \$7,700. An obligatory YouTube video showing the sheep has been viewed worldwide over eleven million times, bringing smiles to many who have not had an overabundance of good news this past year.

While our own Lenten efforts may fall short of having a worldwide impact this year, we may rest assured that putting in the hard work of our annual Orthodox Spring Training will positively help us to compete and succeed in another season of living our Christian life, so that we might partake fully in the glorious Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.


From Father Seraphim

Every one of us has partaken in or witnessed a Sacrament – one of the "Seven" Holy Mysteries of our Church that unite us to Christ and transform us in the process of deification, or *theosis*. Not only are all the Holy Sacraments eschatological – that is, they reveal the in-breaking here and now of the coming Kingdom of God – but they also are given to us by Christ specifically in the final week of His life on earth, which we know as Holy Week. My hope is that after reading a little bit more about each of the major, or most commonly experienced of the Holy Mysteries we will have a deeper sense of appreciation for God in His love for us, especially as we partake of the holiest days of our entire year in the immensely beautiful and profound services in which we experience the suffering, Death, and Resurrection of the Son of God.

What is a Sacrament? First and foremost, the Sacraments are rooted in the acts of Jesus Christ while He was living on earth. They are the extension of the same activity of the same Christ (now through His Body, the Church) that He performed while in the flesh: Healing sick people (Unction), giving Communion to the Apostles at the Last Supper or on the Road to Emmaus (Holy Communion), forgiving sins of the people He encountered (Confession), either being baptized Himself, or commanding that Christians be baptized (Baptism), sending down the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and when He breathed on the Apostles (Chrismation), attending and blessing marriages (Marriage), and ordaining Apostles to go and preach and teach, sharing in His unique authority to bind and loose the sins of mankind (Ordination). What the Church calls Sacraments – a God inspired rite, or ritual involving the material/physical creation as a means of transmitting the uncreated grace or energies of God – are all nascent or foreshadowed, indeed already there in the life and ministry of Jesus. The Sacraments are thus God's own acts which, since He has ascended back up into Heaven, He still performs through His Bishops and Priests in His Holy Body, the Orthodox Church. Now let us turn to Holy Week: Just how are all these Sacraments present in the final week of Jesus' life?

Let us begin with the first Sacrament that initiates us into the life of the Orthodox Church, Baptism. Of course we know that Christ Himself was baptized. Not because He was a sinner – as John was baptizing for the repentance of sinners to prepare the way for Jesus – but rather because the water itself needed to be cleansed and sanctified by the presence of Christ submerged in it. Christ commanded that we

be baptized or else we cannot see the Kingdom of Heaven (John) 3:5ff.), and that we should be baptized in the Name of the Holy Trinity (Matthew 28:18-20). However, the deepest root and mystery of our baptism is revealed when Christ is asked by the mother of two of His disciples if they could sit on His right and left in His Kingdom. Jesus in return asks the bold disciples, "Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with?" (Mark 10:38) [esus Christ described the Passion, His torture and Death as *His baptism*. St. Paul picks up on this in his Epistle to the Romans, "Or do you not know that as many of us as were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? Therefore we are buried with Him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been united together in the likeness of His Death, certainly we also shall be in the likeness of His Resurrection." (Romans 6:3-5) Thus our baptism is a sharing mystically in Christ's own suffering during Holy Week and His Passion as we willingly pick up our cross daily in love, and follow the Crucified One.

Secondly we have the Sacrament of Chrismation – the anointing with a special oil created by mixture with 64 ingredients according to an ancient formula patterned after the anointing oil described in *Exodus 30:22-33.* Holy Myron is confected and consecrated only by a bishop, and for our Greek Orthodox Churches under the Ecumenical Patriarchate it is made roughly once every ten years inside a Church in Constantinople, beginning on Holy Monday and culminating in the Divine Liturgy on Holy Thursday when it is carried in the Great Entrance and placed upon the Altar. This connection with Holy Week mirrors the Lord's own anointing by Mary, the Sister of Lazaros six days before His Passion. The word "Christ" or Χριστός means "Anointed One" (the translation of the Hebrew Messiah into Greek) and thus Christ is anointed with aromatic oil on His Head like the Old Testament Prophets, Priests, and Kings as the fulfillment of all three. There is also a deeper link and meaning: The sacrificial animals in Jerusalem offered on the Altar by the Jews were also anointed before they were slaughtered and this is why Jesus said about his own anointing in Holy Week, "Leave her alone, it was intended that she should save this perfume for the day of My burial." (John 12:8) Christ's anointing by the Holy Spirit then is a two-fold anointing: He is the Great High Priest, the Ultimate and Final Prophet of Israel and the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, but He is also the sacrificial victim, "The Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world." (John 1:29) Therefore as Orthodox Christians (literally "little Christ's," or "fellow anointed ones") we are also Chrismated into Christ's two-fold anointing to be co-heirs with Him in heaven, and to suffer and die with Him forgiving all and participating in His redemption of the world through our own sufferings.

We must never forget that Holy Communion, or the Eucharist is based directly in Holy Week: We receive only the Risen Lord's *broken* Body and *shed* Blood – there is no other source of Holy Communion! The source of all forgiveness and thus the Sacrament or Mystery of Confession is the Cross: By the shed Blood of Jesus we can come and be reconciled with God before His priests, who only by grace share in Christ's unique



power to forgive us; without the Cross we have no forgiveness of our sins or freedom from death and the devil. Holy Unction, the Sacrament of healing is intentionally placed by our Church on the evening of Holy Wednesday because we know that, in the words of the Prophet Isaiah, "By His stripes we are healed." (Isaiah 53:5)

May this year's Holy Week truly be a time of renewal for all of us as we come back into the opened doors not only of our Parish, but of Christ's Kingdom. As we experience the divine services of Holy Week and in the Holy Sacraments of our Church, we are mystically united in body and soul to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.





Orthodox Bookstore

Greetings from the Bookstore!

Please forgive the personal note here, but this coming April will be seven years since the first night I ever set foot inside our beautiful Greek Orthodox Church. It was the Eve of Holy Pascha and of course I had no idea what was going on after having decided to visit out of nowhere after many years of staunch agnosticism. You could say that night was "all Greek to me," especially when the lights suddenly went out just before midnight. I remember hearing a lot of anxious "shushing" from the pews and repeated calls to ensure that every single light in the Church was put out. Then, from out of the silence and pitch of black I heard the now familiar voice of Father John carrying the proclamation of the Light of Christ coming into the world of darkness. A flicker of light appeared in the Altar and then spread forth from one candle to the next until the entire Church was fully illumined and practically glowing. It was awesome. And in those first moments after midnight that particular night it also happened to be my birthday, but I knew I would not be blowing out any of these candles! Then and there I wondered how anybody could possibly want to extinguish this Light of Christ, as had historically been the case from time to time.



Perhaps it was no coincidence, but before that first experience of Holy Pascha, I had just finished reading this month's featured selection, *The Way of a Pilgrim*, by an anonymous source thought to be a Russian peasant (though this is now debated), narrating his personal spiritual journey with the aim of convincing the reader that mental prayer, the Jesus Prayer, is possible in every condition of life pursuant to St. Paul's exhortation to "pray unceasingly." (1 Thessalonians 5:17) First printed in Kazan, Russia in 1884, it soon became a rare book considered to be somewhat esoteric and yet held in high regard by all seekers into the ways of the Orthodox prayer life. I was sold. A couple of early passages really resonated with me after so many years of disappointing personal observations about what I was being led to believe was authentic Christianity:

"You have been given the privilege of understanding that the heavenly light of incessant inner prayer is not found in worldly wisdom or in mere striving for outward knowledge. On the contrary, it is attained in poverty of spirit, in active experience, and in simplicity of heart."

"And one of the most lamentable things is the vanity of elementary knowledge which drives people to measure the Divine by a human yardstick."

I could not have agreed more as these words were a far cry from manmade "religious" spirits of selfrighteousness and virtue signaling that were (thank God!) driving me to dig a little deeper. Having devoured the rest of the book, I went about seeking the Church that actually espoused such "poverty of spirit, active experience, and simplicity of heart." And since my studies had taught me that almost all of the New Testament was originally written in Greek, it made sense to first go "straight to the horse's mouth!" The rest is history, but knowing this latter tidbit about biblical Greek caused me to ultimately learn just who would actually want to extinguish the Light of Christ. Right from the start, it was the irrational mob backing "Barabbas!" Discovering that Barabbas is a name that means "son of the father" was really eye opening. This angry mob before Pontius Pilate was actually advocating to free the carnal son of the father as opposed to our Lord, THE Son of the Father. Whoa! Absent the proper translation, I had no idea this could be read as sort of a crossroads story about which "way" to go. The mob backing Barabbas was not ruled by simplicity of heart or poverty of spirit, and certainly not inner prayer. Their passions, ego, and animal instincts were so far-gone that releasing a murderer was far more preferable to the personal threat of the new human yardstick in Christ that utterly usurps self-centered and unchecked desires – the Darkness – which seems to be gaining steam around us these days.
