From Father John Beloved in Christ:

"All they ever talk about is money!" This is a common complaint by parish members, not only at St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church . . . but we could honestly say at any parish of any city in the US. In his

book, *Maximize*, Nelson Searcy writes, "Jesus was never afraid to talk about money. Outside of the Kingdom of God, Stewardship was His favorite subject. He spoke more about money and possessions than about faith and prayer combined." Just imagine: If Father Seraphim or



I were to speak on the subject of money as often as Christ did, we would have to cover it in our homilies every third Sunday! In our parish, we dedicate one month each year – the month of November – to *literally* addressing Stewardship in our sermons . . . so it is an exaggeration to say, "All we ever talk about is money!"

The sad truth in our parish is, however, that our Stewardship is broken – and what is most disheartening is that our parish leaders are often put in the position of begging for Stewardship. As the only Greek Orthodox Church in Las Vegas – in a metropolitan area approaching two million people – we struggle to get 450 Stewards (pledging individuals or families). The reality is that we minister to many more than that – and we do so non-discriminately because, after all, we are a Church and this is the right thing to do. We do not require you to be a pledging and up-to-date Steward to visit you in the hospital, to bless your newborn infants, to counsel you when you are struggling, to pray for you when you die, or to bless your home. We even open to you our Community Center, without a fee, for your meetings, classes and social events, whether or not you are a Steward – and although we are criticized by some for doing so, as a Church it is the right thing to do.

What we may not realize – and this is the reason Jesus spoke of money so often – is that there is a very deep and critical connection between our personal spiritual life and our attitude toward money and possessions. At a crucial point in His Sermon on the Mount, our Lord taught, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in Heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:19-21) Relating to Stewardship, Christ is saying that when we hold back from His Church, our hearts are in the wrong place, as we are not laying up for ourselves treasures in Heaven – and further, our broken Stewardship is a reflection of our broken spirituality, as our hearts are not in full communion with our Lord.

At the conclusion of the Parable of the Talents, the Lord says to the servant who was wise with the property entrusted to him, "You have been faithful over a little, I will set you over much; enter into the joy of your Master." (Matthew 25:21) My beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, we have been richly blessed with a wonderful Greek Orthodox Church and Community in Las Vegas, Nevada – but do we fully comprehend the integral role that each and every one of us has as Stewards of the Faith? God has blessed us not only with a Church, but has blessed each of us with an ability – through our financial resources, our time as volunteers, and our unique and special talents – so that we can contribute to making His Body here alive and dynamic. Better yet, our prayerful and generous Stewardship prepares us to enter into the joy of our Master – that is, there is a Heavenly reward for us as faithful Stewards! (Continued on Page 3)

The decision is ultimately ours to make: We either live for Christ and His Church ... or we do not. We can make excuses about why we choose to be stingy toward the Church or to not give at all: However, let us remember that in the end we do not have to answer to our Parish Priests, Parish Council or Stewardship Committee members – rather, we have to answer to the One Who brought us into being, blessed us with all we have, and established a Church for our sanctification. When we have genuine faith and gratitude to God, there is no room for excuses – only a desire to please Him and listen to Him, which is manifested in our willing and loving Stewardship.





Parish Report

As we move into the Holiday Season and toward the end of the current year, it is time to take a realistic and hard look at our Church, its future in terms of Stewardship and finances. Council This is an extremely urgent and critical situation and everyone needs to fully appreciate both the scope and magnitude of what it takes to operate our Church and where we are failing. As everyone knows, Stewardship is supposed to fully finance the operations of the Church. This

would leave the revenue from the annual Greek Food Festival to provide funds strictly for capital improvements. Unfortunately, our Stewardship contributions are failing miserably and thus, harming the present reality and future vision of our Church. If the comments in this letter seem repetitive of previous articles, it is because the Stewardship shortfalls continue to remain a problem that many Parishioners are simply ignoring. We cannot stress enough the dire need to comprehend and urgency needed to address these issues; otherwise, we are going to have to make some very difficult and heart wrenching decisions that will ultimately adversely affect us all going forward and worshiping in our chosen Holy Orthodox Faith. WE CAN NO LONGER CONTINUE ON THE PRESENT PATH WHICH WE ARE ON. SOMETHING NEEDS TO CHANGE AND CHANGE NOW! For over twenty years, there have been extensive efforts by many to improve the Stewardship situation in our Church; however, for some reason, we remain at virtually the same level year after year – and this is despite the fact that many more Orthodox people are residing in our growing Metropolitan Area. We urge you to read on.

Here is the alarming reality facing our Church: For the past two decades, we have been falling way short in financing the operations of our Church and unfortunately, we seem to be getting worse. As alluded to above, Stewardship continues to be a struggle and we need to fix this yesterday. Sadly, without the Food Festival, we simply would not be able to make ends meet. Of particular importance: In the last three months, this year's Festival proceeds were used to cover almost a hundred thousand dollars of shortfalls in the operating budget. After paying our annual Archdiocese Commitment of \$122,787, and the mortgage for the year, there is *absolutely nothing left* from the Festival to fund any capital projects for the Church or to fix any unscheduled maintenance items. Despite herculean efforts and unrelenting appeals by Stewardship Committees, Parish Councils, Clergy, and many other concerned Parishioners regarding Stewardship, it appears that there is only a small minority of Parishioners who truly care and worry about keeping the Church's doors open. Many Parishioners want to put their heads in the sand and pretend things are fine and take the attitude of, "Why should I worry? Someone else will take care of it." This is extremely disheartening for us as a Parish because it takes a collective effort on everyone's part to have a Church, and truthfully, it also takes money.

Here are the numbers in a nutshell: Presently, it takes approximately \$950,000 a year to operate our Church. This figure includes expenditures for Clergy compensation, employee salaries, health insurance, other insurance, utilities, water, cleaning and general maintenance of Church/Office facilities and grounds, Church Ministries, Archdiocese Commitments, Metropolis Commitments, Clergy Laity Events, Church supplies (including but not limited to candles), office supplies, equipment leases, and many, many other items. This \$950,000 figure does not include capital expenses for such things as paying the mortgage for the year, repairing the roofs, repairing parking lots, repainting the Church and Community Center, repairing the Church grounds, or redoing the floors in Panos and Kokkos Halls, or expanding our facilities. Many of these items are going to need to be completed in the next few years. Stewardship is supposed to cover all of the \$950,000 in operating expenses; however, in the past couple of decades, it has only covered roughly 35% to 42% of the operating expenses.

To illustrate the Stewardship numbers, let's look at last year which ended December 31, 2017. Stewardship receipts were around \$380,635 with 440 Stewardship families contributing. This left a shortfall of around \$569,365 for simply operating the Church, and equates to Stewardship only covering roughly 40% of the operating budget. The average contribution by each Stewardship family was only around \$865. This is alarming because the level of giving in our Parish is less than 1.5% of the median income in the Las Vegas Metropolitan area. The Uniform Parish Regulations suggest that Parishioners give 10% of their income for Stewardship. We are by no means suggesting that anyone has to contribute 10% of their income. We only mention it to provide some perspective. (Continued on Page 5)

The sad thing is that with 440 families contributing, it would only take an average Stewardship contribution of around \$2,159 to fully fund the Church operating expenses. Sadly, this simple fact continually fails to resonate with and eludes the vast majority of our Parish. Another troubling aspect of the situation is that we have several hundred more families on our Church lists and many more who are not on our lists, which receive sacraments and other services from our Church, and who for some reason or another, choose not to contribute financially.

To cover last year's shortfall in operating the Church, we had to rely on other income sources, such as funds received from passing the trays, candle sales, donations, fund raisers, C&E revenues, Nasri Academy rental revenue, and Bookstore sales. Regrettably, these income sources still failed to cover the shortfall and we were thus left covering the remaining shortfall with funds received from the Festival. Stating the obvious, using Festival funds in this manner left and leaves the Church a very limited amount of funds to use for capital expenditures. Although the Church has always managed to pay its bills despite the perpetual shortfall in Stewardship, it has come at a very steep price. We are left with little to no funding to properly maintain and improve our facilities. Plainly speaking, this absolutely affects our present and future viability. The scary thing is that in the very near future, we are going to need to make some very significant repairs to the Church and the Community Center, and we are not going to have the necessary funds to complete them if something does not radically change soon with Stewardship.

We implore every Parishioner in the most urgent of terms to take action and help become part of <u>our solution</u>. Our present and future viability depends on us working together. We ask and urge those individuals and families who are not contributing to Stewardship, to now do so, and further ask and urge those who are already giving to reassess their level of giving and think about giving more: not grudgingly, but with joy and in a way that is appropriate to their level of income. The question has often been asked: "What do I get for being a Steward in the Church?" The most important answer is that you receive many tremendous gifts such as a place to worship God in your chosen Faith; a place to receive the Sacraments; Clergy to administer the Sacraments, and to tend to the spiritual growth and needs of our Parishioners; and a place to find Fellowship. Stewardship also helps fund other gifts such as the various Church Ministries, Adult and Youth Choir, Church School, Greek School, GOYA for teenagers, Folk Dance Groups, Orthodox Family Fellowship, Young Adults, Kali Parea, Senior Forerunners, Sports, an Orthodox Bookstore, Adult Study, and so much more. Stewardship is our way of showing our gratitude to God for His rich blessings to us, giving back to Him by supporting His Holy Church, and willingly participating in the ministries, our Parish events, and most importantly, the sacramental and liturgical life. Please look to your hearts, pray, and find inspiration to help the present and future financial situation of our Church. Thank you and God Bless!



Stewardship and Community Outreach

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Glory to God for all things. Although Stewardship is our way of life, our Parish dedicates the month of November to Stewardship as a way of reminding us of the importance of being merciful and sharing our blessings with one another. May we all prayerfully reflect on the blessings He has bestowed upon us and, *on Stewardship Sunday, November 18*, let our pledge mirror the importance we give to financially support our Parish and show mercy to one another. Our blessed financial support enables our Parish Priests to offer the sacraments, visit the sick, help the grieving, spiritually nourish the souls of all of us, and help prepare those who are about to fall asleep in the Lord for eternal life. Our gifts to Father John's Discretionary Fund enable him to help our fellow sisters and brothers in Christ when they are dealing with misfortune and are in need of a helping hand.



In the Lord's Sermon on the Mount, He stated: "Blessed are the merciful for they shall obtain mercy." (Matthew 5:7) The Greek word for almsgiving is eleēmosynē, and it literally translates to "mercifulness." In English, to show mercy and to give alms are two different things. Yet, in Greek, they are expressed from the same verb elecin. So, one important example of being merciful would be in the giving of alms to those in need. However, is this all it means to be merciful? Of course not.

The Lord showed us many examples of mercy when He laid out who would inherit the Kingdom and those who would not when He told the parable concerning the separation of the sheep from the goats in *Matthew's Gospel (25:31-46)*. Those who will inherit the Kingdom of God showed mercy by feeding the hungry, giving drink to those in need, taking in strangers, clothing the naked, and visiting those who were sick and in prison. When we show these acts of mercy we are, in fact, giving these things to the Lord.

St. Nikolai Velimirovich tells the following story of a man who became merciful to the poor: "Once in Church I heard a priest say that whoever gives to the poor, gives into the Hands of Christ Himself. I didn't believe it, for I thought, 'How can this be, when Christ is in heaven?' However, I was on my way home one day and I saw a poor man begging, and the face of Christ shone above his head! Just then a passerby gave the beggar a piece of bread, and I saw the Lord extend His Hand, take the bread, and bless the donor. From then on, I have always seen Christ's Face shining above the beggars. Therefore, with great fear I perform as much charity as I can." (Prologue of Ochrid, Reflection for September 18)

The above example of mercy is a physical means of being merciful. Other physical ways of being merciful could include helping people get to a doctor's appointment, attend Church, pay bills, help with housework, find a job, get medical help for an addiction, and so on. The list of opportunities to offer physical mercy is nearly limitless.

However, there are also many spiritual acts of mercy we can perform which will be received by the Lord just as in the story by St. Nikolai. Some examples: Just as we can physically feed and give drink to the poor, we can also feed them spiritually through missionary work or supporting Orthodox missionary programs, such as the Orthodox Christian Mission Center. We can pray for people, bring them holy water, and request the Priest to give them Holy Communion and Unction. We can console the grieving and the dying, raise our children in a Christ centered life, and not return evil for evil.

St. John Chrysostom noted in a homily that when the Lord says, "Blessed are the merciful," He is not just talking about those who give money, but those who likewise are merciful in their actions toward others. He goes on to say: "For the way of showing mercy is manifold, and this commandment is broad." (The Gospel of Matthew, Homily XV) When the Lord completes this commandment with "for they shall obtain mercy," it is important to understand that the mercy we give as men and women is reciprocated by the Lord's mercy toward us; for His mercy is far greater than any mercy we could ever show toward one another. Let us then strive to be merciful to one another in thought, word and deed, in obedience to the Lord's commandment, and so receive the Divine mercy of God in our lives as well!



From Father Seraphim


On *November 8* each year we commemorate – as well as contemplate – the Synaxis of the Archangels Michael and Gabriel and all the other Bodiless Powers. These "other bodiless powers" can often seem to be too mysterious of a topic to discuss (let alone get to know personally) as can also happen with the Saints, the Bible, Prayer, or any other Spiritual thing. The angels, however, in all their variations and ranks may not be as mysterious as we think: after all they are mentioned throughout Scripture 296 times. The entire Bible presents us with the reality of angels as living and active creatures of God. From Genesis to Revelation and nearly everywhere in-between we hear how they guard the tree of life (Genesis 3:24) and tell of what will happen in the end of days (Revelation 1:1). We hear how they kill the evil and wicked (Joshua 5:13-16) and minister to the holy (Matthew 4:11). They comfort and strengthen those in great sorrow and distress (Luke 22:43), and of course announce instruction and the "good news" of the Incarnation to the Lord's faithful (Matthew 2:13).

The feast we celebrate on November 8 is called the "Synaxis," which means the "oneness of mind" or "unity of purpose of the holy angels." Thus we also celebrate all the angels who did not fall away from God with the Devil and instead remain now forever within the Kingdom of God. When we look at all of the references from Scripture together, we find that the purpose of the angelic beings is two-fold: To serve God by carrying out His commands; and to be a helper for man. Interestingly, both mankind and the angels share one single purpose: To worship God – with man called even further to share God's own Divine Trinitarian Life, and become like Christ Himself. No other angel helps us more in our daily struggle to refrain from sin, grow in virtue and to worship God, than our own Guardian Angel.

Unfortunately, it seems that an excess of cute miniature statues with harps and poetic children's nighttime prayers have made the impression on humanity that Guardian Angels cuddle our little babes and then they vanish - or are somehow less impressive or important as the child grows into adulthood. This is simply inaccurate. The Guardian Angel who is assigned to a person on their Baptismal day surely does rejoice

over the playful innocence of the baby, but in no way does this awesome Guardian cease for even a day to strive to save the soul of the Christian he is assigned to guard.

It will be our Guardian Angel whom we will see when we breathe our last and open our eyes to the eternal spiritual world. They who understand the voiceless language of our souls have been listening to us our entire life. They have never left our side, even when we sin and distance ourselves from God's grace. Read that again! Now, think for a few moments about the gravity of this! Our angel has seen every secret good we have ever done, and also every sin committed discreetly. Yet, he does not shame us nor abandon us, neither does he laugh at us (as do the fallen angels when we fall prey to their



What can we do to celebrate this Holy Feast? First of all, we can come to the Divine Liturgy, celebrated this year in anticipation on Wednesday evening, November 7. Before coming to Holy Confession we can ask our Angel to help us remember our falls in order to do everything we can in preparation to become both clean and forgiven. Whoever says with complete faith to their angel, "You are my protector! Take my outstretched hand!" will neither fear the threats of man nor the circumstances of their life. Let us strive to conscientiously honor our Guardian Angel and strive against sin. Then, when we depart for the age to come we will have a sure helper, protector, and advocate against the demons, and also before the Throne of God at the time of our final judgment. Father Scraphem







For us who cannot see the fallen spirits with our bodily eyes, it is necessary to learn to see them with the eyes of the soul."
