Beloved in Christ:

Beginning with Palm Sunday on April 21, Orthodox Christians will make a spiritual pilgrimage from near and far for the services of Great and Holy Week. These wonderful services lead us on a spiritual journey through the Passion and Death of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and finally to the magnificent apex of the entire Lenten season and Holy Week - His

glorious third-day Resurrection!

As most of you know, I was blessed to lead a pilgrimage of 35 faithful to the Holy Land toward the end of last year: This pilgrimage was crowned by our visit, or rather our ascent to the ancient Queen City, Jerusalem, where we literally walked the roads and venerated – and in the most awe-inspiring occasion,

even worshipped – at the holy sites where our Lord instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper, prayed in agony before His betrayal, stood trial, carried His Cross, was Crucified, laid in the Tomb and Resurrected from the dead.

Months later, I can clearly remember arriving back to our hotel at 4:00 am, still very much wide awake following an amazing Midnight Divine Liturgy with Archbishop Theophanes, nine priests (six Greeks, a Russian, a Romanian and this beardless Greek American) and two deacons (including Archdeacon Evlogios who has visited our Parish) at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. Although we were in the midst of the Nativity season, the experience felt more like Pascha – and I was truly blessed to participate in this holy service: The Archbishop and my fellow celebrants were extremely kind and this Liturgy was an experience of genuine brotherhood in Christ around the Altar where Christianity – and our salvation – has its roots.





During the Doxology we processed from the enormous Altar in the Catholikon to the tiny, intimate Altar that was placed before the opening of our Lord's Tomb. The Proskomide (service of Preparation) was conducted on the "Agio Tafo" - and breaking from the normal protocol, as a humble gesture of the unity of the Priesthood in Christ, the Archbishop invited each priest to offer his commemorations on the paten, which required each of us, one at a time, to kneel as It was humbling and awesome to we did so. commemorate both the living and the departed - my hierarch, my brother priests, my family and the members of our beloved Parish - at the holy site of our

Lord's Entombment and Resurrection. Admittedly, this holy vigil was the most powerful and spiritually life -changing experience for the thousands of pilgrims who were present, clergy and laity alike: Prior to the service all of us were given the opportunity to prayerfully venerate on our knees the Tomb of Christ and, moreover at the Liturgy, we were united with our Resurrected Savior and one another as we received His precious and Life-giving Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist. However, for this spiritual pilgrimage to have its dynamic renewing effect in our lives, each and every one of us must forego our mundane and normal activities and, instead, make a concerted effort to immerse ourselves fully in the divine services of the Church. To learn about the significance of each day and service of Holy Week and Pascha, the Feast of all feasts, please read the article on pages 4-5.

As we make our spiritual ascent to the Heavenly Jerusalem during Holy Week, I pray that each of us will arrive with anticipation and joy at the empty Tomb of our Savior and experience a glorious Pascha and Resurrection! Καλο Πασχα και Καλη Ανασταση!

Great and Holy Week Services

During Palm Sunday weekend – *April 20–21* – our Parish will be blessed with the presence of His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos for the services of Saturday evening Palm Sunday Vespers, Palm Sunday morning Orthros and Hierarchical Divine Liturgy and the First Bridegroom (*Nymphios*) Service that evening. Great and Holy Week actually begins with the Orthros of Holy Monday – known as the Bridegroom Service – on Palm Sunday evening: For three nights we have our eyes fixed on the icon of Jesus Christ, the Bridegroom of the Church, in the center of the Soleas – although this is an image of our Lord clothed in a scarlet robe, crowned with thorns, hands bound, and holding a reed. The hymns and readings of these services set the stage for our Lord's Passion, while simultaneously making us mindful of His imminent Second Coming:



while simultaneously making us mindful of His imminent Second Coming: "Behold, the Bridegroom approaches in the middle of the night, and blessed is the one He finds awake and waiting."


In the Greek Orthodox practice, the Sacrament of Holy Unction is placed mid-week and, as a service of healing, its link to Christ's Passion is indisputable: We humans are sick – physically, emotionally and spiritually – as a result of Adam and Eve's Fall and the perpetual sinfulness of each generation. In the seventh and final Gospel reading of the service, the Lord's words are directed to each of us: "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick." (Matthew 9:12) All of us are in desperate need of the healing and redemption of our Great Physician, Jesus Christ, and as we shall see within a day, "with His stripes we are healed." (Isaiah 53:5)



Holy Thursday is the turning point of Holy Week: Although the services become more powerful and admittedly much longer, the saving works of our Lord accelerate rapidly – within twelve hours we witness in hymns, readings and liturgical actions our Lord Jesus Christ washing the feet of His Disciples, instituting the Mystical Supper (the Eucharist), as well as His betrayal by Judas Iscariot, His agony in the garden of Gethsemane, His arrest, trial, mocking and scourging, His death sentence and, at the climax, His voluntary Crucifixion for the salvation of the world. That evening, after the fifth of twelve Gospel readings, the priest carries the Lord's Cross, just as Simon of Cyrene, and after placing the Crucified Lord in the midst of the faithful, he solemnly intones, "We worship Your Passion, O Christ. Show us now Your glorious Resurrection."

On the most solemn day of the year, Holy Friday, our faithful are encouraged to take an

additional day off from school and work to be present for the beautiful and spiritually stirring services. At the mid-afternoon service the priest reads the long Gospel passage recounting the Lord's Crucifixion and Death, and toward the end he pauses to bring the narrative home: He goes before the Cross, prostrates himself and then solemnly removes our Lord, wraps Him in a linen shroud, and places Him in the Altar, which becomes His Tomb. Shortly after, the priest processes the *Epitaphios* (the cloth icon of the Entombed Lord) around the Church and then gently



lays Him in the Sepulcher. That night, the faithful gather in the Church for the Funeral of our Lord Jesus Christ, and with candles in hand all chant the Lamentations: "In a grave they laid You, O my life and my Christ; and the armies of the angels were quite amazed, as they sang the praise of Your submissive love."


Parish Council Report KALO PASCHA! Visas Approved! We recently received word that the Visas for the Iconographers were approved. As previously stated, the light at the end of the tunnel is growing bigger and brighter. The Iconographers presently have appointments scheduled with the US Consulate in Greece on April 11, 2019, and should receive their Visas within a couple days thereafter. Once they receive their Visas, they are free to travel here immediately to

complete their work. We anticipate they will be here before Palm Sunday, and will be working through Holy Week and thereafter. Finally, the scaffolding will soon be coming down! We especially want to thank Kosta Fountas for all his hard work as our Immigration Attorney in getting these Visas approved.

We want to thank all the many volunteers who are stepping up with their time and talents to help with Holy Week and all the related activities, such as the Palm Sunday Luncheon and the Agape Picnic. Your efforts, as always, provide a beautiful and meaningful experience for all during this most important holiday season in our Church, and we greatly appreciate it. We are looking forward to a tremendous Holy Week and joining together to worship in our Faith. We are also pleased and honored that Metropolitan Gerasimos will be here over the Palm Sunday weekend to worship and celebrate with us. Please keep in mind that the Palm Sunday Luncheon will be held on April 21 following Church Services and the Agape Picnic will be held on Pascha, April 28, starting at noon. These are great events for fellowship so please come and join us. You can purchase tickets for the Agape Picnic through the Church Office or in Panos Hall during Fellowship on Sundays.

Over the years, a lot of space in this column has been devoted to Stewardship and, as you all are aware, we are continuing with our relentless never-ending pursuit of fixing Stewardship. Many people complain that we are always asking for money and, the truth is, we are asking for money. Stating the obvious, it takes money to have a Church, and that money has to come collectively from the *prayerful* generosity of all our Parishioners through Stewardship. The reason it seems that we are always asking for money is because Stewardship in our Parish is broken, and has been broken for decades. Because Stewardship is and has been broken, the future of our Church is being adversely affected. For example, our facilities are aging, and we are unable to properly maintain and repair them, which will then make repairs in the future even more extensive and expensive. (Continued on Page 6)

The Vesperal Liturgy of Holy Saturday morning is replete with joyful anticipation, especially with the inspired and spirited chanting of our Youth Choir: Many prophecies from the Old Testament are read, prefiguring Christ's Resurrection on the third day and His power over Death. Just before the reading of the Holy Gospel, the priest sprinkles bay leaves all around the Church – as a symbol of Christ's victory – while chanting triumphantly: "Arise, O God, and judge the earth, for You shall bring all nations to Your inheritance!" Much later that night, thousands will assemble in the darkened Church and in the overflow section under the tent outside: If there is one service people will attend in a year, this is it, for all Orthodox Christians embrace Great and Holy Pascha as the Feast of all feasts.

At midnight the Royal Doors are quickly opened and the priest lights the large Paschal Candle from the solitary flame of the Altar vigil lamp, and then raises it before the faithful, – as a visual expression that our Risen Christ

has overcome the bonds of Hades and Death – proclaiming in chant, "Come, receive the light from the Light that is never overtaken by night and glorify Christ, Who is risen from the dead."

Καλη Ανασταση! Blessed Resurrection!

Moreover, because Stewardship is broken, it is virtually impossible to work on long term goals such as a school, or senior housing. We have been sounding the alarms about Stewardship for years; however, the alarms continue to fall on deaf ears with a large portion of our Parish. We all need to do something significant to fix Stewardship, and invest in the future of our Church. We can no longer continue with the status quo, and it is time to break the vicious cycle hampering our efforts to continue having a great place for worship.

Here are the facts about Stewardship. It takes \$973,000 a year based upon 2018 numbers to operate our Church. This includes expenses for the Archdiocese, Metropolis, Clergy, Mortgage Principal, Church Edifice/Building/Grounds, Administration, Church Fundraising, and Personnel. Pursuant to the Uniform Parish Regulations of the Archdiocese, we are supposed to *completely* cover the operating costs with Stewardship. Unfortunately, last year, like every other previous year, Stewardship only covered roughly 42% of the expenses, and left a shortfall of 58%. In dollars, the shortfall was around \$564,000. Other sources of revenue for the operating expenses are the Bookstore, candles, trays, general donations, religious services, Community Center rentals, and fundraisers. Even with all these other sources of revenue, there was still a shortfall of around \$283,000. To cover this remaining shortfall, we mostly had to use funds from the Food Festival, which in turn funneled money away from capital projects. Without money for capital projects, there was little to no money to cover repairs and maintenance of our buildings and grounds. As it stands right now, we need to repair the parking lots, paint the inside and outsides of the Church and Community Center, replace carpets in the Church, and repair the floors in the Panos and Kokkos Halls. In the near future, we will need to replace the roof on the Church, and eventually we will need to replace many of the heating and air conditioning units in the Church and Community Center. We cannot tackle these things without a fully functioning level of giving toward Stewardship. If Stewardship was working the way it should, we could begin fixing each and every one of these things, and also begin working toward long term goals, and ensure the future of our Church.

Here is where we stand today for 2019 on Stewardship: We presently have pledges of approximately \$360,000. This amount constitutes a present shortfall of \$613,000. As you can well see, we have a long way to go this year. The heartbreaking truth is that to fix Stewardship only requires 450 families to contribute an average of \$2,161 per year or 500 families to contribute an average of \$1,945 dollars per year. (Please note that these are not the maximum suggested contributions, but are simply the average contributions necessary to have a fully functioning Stewardship program). We have made it very easy to contribute. You can contribute with a lump sum payment or make monthly payments. Monthly payments can be deducted directly from your bank account or your credit card or both. You only need to contact the Church Office to make it happen. As we continue in this Lenten Season, please look into your hearts and be grateful for the gifts God has given you and please give back through Stewardship. Challenge everyone you know in our Church to help with Stewardship.

As a reminder, we have our Parish Assembly Meeting scheduled for *Sunday, March 31*, following the Liturgy. These meetings are held semi-annually and are for all Stewards in good standing. There is a lot of important information provided and important votes taken on many things that affect not only the operation of the Church but also the vision of the Church. We encourage all Stewards to attend and participate.

The dates for the 2019 Greek Food Festival are *Friday, September 27 through Sunday, September 29.* Planning has been going at full steam. As stated last month, the immediate priorities are to slot individuals into leadership positions, and to begin aggressively pursuing Pre-Sales, which primarily include selling Raffle Tickets, Souvenir Book Ads, and Coupon Books. Pre-Sales provide the "seed" money for the Festival and, more importantly, good strong pre-sales could conceivably fund up to 40% or more of the expenses going into the Festival, thus, minimizing our risk. The Festival is a community effort, so please step up and help when the time comes.

In closing, we want to again thank the various Church ministries and organizations, and the many individuals for all the work they do. Please get involved as we move forward to make our Church better.

From Father Seraphim

Last month I accompanied Father John and Justina Szukiewicz in traveling to our Metropolis of San Francisco Clergy-Laity Assembly at St. Nicholas Ranch and Retreat Center. This was my first Clergy-Laity experience and I was enlightened, rejuvenated and educated. The main speaker was Father Evan Armatas, who has served at St. Spyridon Greek Orthodox Church in Loveland, Colorado since August 2007. He started with just six families in his Mission Parish there and today, just 12 years later, has a dynamic and growing community of several hundred families, a brand new Church filled with Byzantine Iconography, and an ever-evolving vision of "Parish Health" as a fundamental goal. He gave three inspiring and incredibly well thought-out presentations over two days. For this month of the *Resurrection*, I would like to reflect on one of his "Four Pillars of Parish Health": In a healthy Parish, faith is translated into the daily lives of the Parishioners.

According to Father Evan, between 6,000 and 10,000 Christian churches in the US are dying each year. That means around 100-200 churches will close this week! One difference between dying parishes and communities that persist generation after generation is the ability to pass on the Faith successfully – not in the sense of ideas alone, but Faith also as a way of life with a particular practice (fasting, prayer, Feast Days, chanting, etc.). It can be tempting to blame the increasing secularization of America, church leadership, or national politics, but we must remember the greatest periods of growth, particularly in the first century, came during intense persecution amidst adversarial cultures. Perhaps we are not hindered by external forces as much as by our own lack of commitment and understanding of our Orthodox Tradition, as well as a disconnect between the Gospel and our daily lives.

At the heart of the Gospel and at the heart of our Faith is the empty Tomb of Jesus Christ. It is the culmination of the Birth narratives, the miracle stories and commandments, Passion-week, and the Death of the Messiah. Belief in the Resurrection is not so much a problem for Orthodox Christians: Indeed, on Pascha we love to sing, "Χριστός Ανέστη! Christ is Risen!" However, we need something more than a one day feast – something that Father Evan has identified as a veritable pillar of parish health. The good news of the Resurrection has to find its way into our daily grind, our relationships, and how we think and feel and act. We need the Resurrection of Jesus Christ in our hearts.

As beautiful as the Lenten season of buildup toward the Resurrection is, if Pascha is only one night for us – and then it is all over – we will have fasted and struggled in vain, or with no lasting effect. If we stop coming to Church in May and on through the summer because we have "put in our time" during Lent and, "now we need to rest," then we will have missed the meaning and purpose of Lent and Pascha.

Pascha means "Passover" or "passage." Lent, inseparable from the Resurrection toward which it leads, offers each of us a chance to pass from death to life: From one way of living, of being, of thinking, of acting – to a different one that is holy and renewed by God's own Death for our sins. The extra prayer, the focus on God, confession of our sins and the fasting or ceasing from sinning which we take up as a discipline in preparation to see the Risen Lord does not go away after the Resurrection! On the contrary, the week after Pascha is called *Renewal Week*, when the renewed community of Christians walks in the Light of Pascha every day; and *then* we spend 50 whole days in celebration until Pentecost! I hope that we are all trying to adopt new life-habits, a renewed mindset and a Christ-like mode of being in the world as we learn from our Mother, the Church, how to walk on the paths of salvation these holy days.

Our own personal, ongoing, and ultimate connection to the Resurrection of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ is experienced every time we receive the Blood that was shed, and the Body that was broken – of the One Who died for the life of the world, and rose to renew us. Christ's own Self-offering continues to be experienced by our St. John the Baptist community every Sunday (which is a mini-Pascha!), and all the major Feast Days in the Divine Liturgy. For we receive the Risen Lord in Holy Communion; we receive Divine Life from the Conqueror of death, sin, and the devil. As we stay united to Jesus Christ through Holy Communion and in His Church year-round, we will experience the gift of His own Presence in us each day of our lives, and by His grace even at the moment of our own death – which becomes our own personal pascha from this life and this world, to the Kingdom of God.



Kalo Pascha!

As we journey onward to our Lord's Passion and Holy Resurrection, I am taking a moment to pause and reflect on the recent Clergy and Laity Retreat I had the blessing to attend on behalf of our Parish faithful. Our theme was "The Great Commission in the Parish," and was based on Christ's words, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.



Amen." (Matthew 28:19-20) The title and scripture reference is very much self-explanatory thus it will not be my primary point in this piece.

Instead I would like to focus on the Mission Parish representatives whom I encountered. It was very exciting to see that Orthodoxy is growing in our Metropolis, and that there are faithful folks in various areas that are willing to give it their all in helping establish a new Parish Church! As Lent progresses, the Bookstore has many options to assist on your spiritual journey. In the spirit of Lent, we chose to feature books from St. Ephraim the Syrian, whose prayer we say during Lenten liturgical services (Lord and Master of my life . . .).

St. Ephraim was an early Church Father who is known for his role in the 1^{st} Ecumenical Council in Nicea and is considered the "Saint of

Repentance." He penned over 400 hymns, many homilies and biblical commentaries in prose. His works show his humility and are poetic. Our choice for April is this brand new book from St. Anthony Monastery, *Eschatological Hymns and Homilies*, by St. Ephraim the Syrian.

"My sinfulness is beyond words, nor could the sea wash me clean; yet this have I said, this do I say: That Thy Love is greater than my offenses. The waves of the sea are fewer than my sins; yet if weighed in the balance with Thy Love, they are as nothing."

We also carry Saint Ephraim's very popular *A Spiritual Psalter*. "If He was not flesh, who was crucified on the cross? And if He is not God, who shook the foundations of the earth?"


