From Father John "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven." (Matthew 5:3)

Beloved in Christ:

As I write this meditation, our country has just endured the longest government shutdown in US history – and it seems that with each passing day both elected government officials and the citizens of our nation continue digging their heels deeper in the proverbial sand

on the issue of the border wall. This impasse affected all of us, and most especially our furloughed federal workers. While my intent is *not* to focus on this political issue, the behaviors are all too familiar as we unfortunately also experience impasses in many other facets of our lives: Stalemates occur in our marriages, in relationships between parents and their children, among siblings, peers, coworkers, business partners or competitors, countries, religious groups and, sadly, even between Church members. St. Paul wisely said to the divided Church in Corinth, "Love does not insist on its own way" (1 Corinthians 13:4) – and his powerful words are still so relevant!

When humility is lacking we will experience divisions, and when there is an unwillingness to be humble then an emotional, physical and spiritual stalemate is inevitable. Although we are inclined to justify in our minds why we are holding our ground, usually in the name of self preservation, we become blind to the reality that the only one who benefits in these situations is Satan. St. John Climacos, who was astute in battling the devil and his legion of demons, wrote, "Humility is the only virtue that no devil can imitate. If pride made demons out of angels, there is no doubt that humility could make angels out of demons."

Our Lord Jesus Christ showed us the path to glory by His own humility in His every action: His Nativity in the Flesh in a humble manger . . . His circumcision eight days after His Birth and His being offered to the Temple for a blessing by the Elder Simeon on the fortieth day, both in accordance with the Mosaic Law . . . His Baptism in the Jordan River by the hands of John the Forerunner . . . His rebuking of Satan when tempted . . . His poverty . . . His charity . . . His compassion . . . His healings on the Sabbath, for which He was continuously criticized by the religious elite . . . His riding upon a donkey into Jerusalem . . . His washing of His Disciples' feet . . . His prayer of obedience to God the Father in the Garden of Gethsemane . . . and by His voluntary Crucifixion, Descent into Hades and Resurrection, by which we have been saved.

Having recently visited the Holy Land, I can clearly visualize the fertile hillside near the Sea of Galilee where Jesus offered His Sermon on the Mount: When our Lord opened His Mouth to offer His much beloved sermon (which encompasses three chapters in St. Matthew's Gospel), He began with the words, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven." As St. John Chrysostom observed, "Christ blesses those first who become humble by choice, and not circumstance." Being "poor in spirit" reflects the state of our soul before God: Christ blesses those who are awestruck and tremble at His commandments, and those who are contrite and lowly-minded – this is the opposite of pride, which is the root of our separation from Him and His Kingdom. Even the manner in which our Lord presents His saving teaching – that is, by way of a blessing, rather than advice or commandment – makes it less burdensome. Love blesses . . . love invites . . . love does not insist on its own way!

Parish Council Report We just had our first Parish Council Meeting for the new year, and have set forth three major priorities for the coming year as well as the priorities for the coming years. Our *first* priority is, of course, Stewardship. We fervently hope that this is the year when we finally fix the Stewardship Program, which would allow us to address other pressing issues that have been neglected for over the past decade. Specifically, our facilities are aging and in desperate

need of significant repairs and a major overhaul. Because we keep diverting funds away from these very important necessities – due to using the monies to cover the operating costs of the Church – things are only going to get worse with our facilities. As a community we really need to finally get Stewardship on track.

Our *second* priority is to continue replacing the roof on the Community Center. Every time it rains, we have significant flooding in the Kitchen and Storage areas. Recently, we started having leaks into the Library. Thank God, with Father John's roof appeal, Paul and Brandi Hamilton quickly and generously donated \$40,000 to re-roof these areas. Additionally, we received \$10,000 from George and Sarah Markantonis and \$5,000 from Mike and Effie Lekar for the roof replacement. Thanks to the generous donations, we are now in the process of getting bids to replace the roof as needed.

Our *third* and final priority is to fix the parking lot. Our parking lot is in disrepair. There are so many wide cracks on the southern parking lot that we could lease it out for the filming of an earthquake movie. We not only need to fix the parking lot, but to stripe it as well.

Another priority we will need to address in the very near future is repainting the interior and exterior of the Church and Community Center. The exteriors are starting to fade and show wear from the weather, and the interiors are starting to show significant wear and tear. On the exteriors, there are a lot of cracks in the stucco and stucco coming loose, and on the interiors, there are several cracks forming inside the Church on the ceiling leading up to the dome and in other places. These things need to get fixed along with the repainting effort before they get worse.

We will also need to redo the floors in Panos and Kokkos Halls. We refinished them a couple years ago, but they need to be redone again – not only for appearance purposes, but also to preserve them. The biggest issue we will need to address in about a year is the A/C and heating systems. Our systems are old and breaking down more and more. We have been able to repair them for the most part; however, in little over a year, we will not be able to obtain Freon any longer which will make repairing the A/C systems virtually impossible. Stating the obvious, we will have to change them out and, needless to say, this will be a significant expense. Not to keep harping on the same thing over and over again: If our Stewardship Program was working as it should, we could address these issues with minimal hardship, one by one.

Another issue that needs to get fixed ASAP is the Kitchen. It is a perpetual mess: We do a deep cleaning and in matter of a couple of weeks, it is a complete mess again. The biggest problem is that many people who use the kitchen do not seem to care about cleaning up after they are done. We implore you: If you use the kitchen, please leave it better than you found it. We are in the process of dealing with some huge issues pertaining to the Kitchen. Once these issues are resolved, we are going to do a mass sterilization cleaning of the entire Kitchen, Storage areas and Halls. As part of this process, we will take everything not bolted down out of the Kitchen, the Storage areas, and Halls, and do a full sterilization cleaning of them before putting them back. We are also in the process of doing a full purge of many items in the Storage areas; we will be throwing out or giving away a lot of stuff that has just been occupying space for several years.

As many of you have undoubtedly heard, we have a rodent problem on our property. We have been working extensively with an exterminator to remedy the problem. This may take a few more weeks. As a more permanent solution to the problem, we have obtained a couple of "working cats." The cats are presently being kept in a cage on the Church property and will remain caged for 30 days. The purpose of doing this is to acclimate the cats to their new home; at the end of this 30–day period, they will be allowed to roam the property and do their thing. Please note that these are "feral cats" and may not be friendly. Please tell your kids to leave them alone and not to chase them around to try to pet them or pick them up. If the cats want to interact, they will come to you, not the other way around. Also, please note that these cats will most likely scratch and bite, so again, please inform your kids accordingly.

Pertaining to the Iconography, we are still waiting for the US Immigration Service to send someone out from their Southern California office to verify that we are a Church. Please understand we all think this is ludicrous; however, for whatever reason, it is a requirement that needs to be fulfilled. Once this inspection is completed, we can then hopefully get the Iconographers their appropriate visas. It has been almost two years, and the end of this ordeal is now in sight. Keep praying!

We have scheduled our next *Parish Assembly on Sunday, March 24* in Panos Hall, shortly after the Liturgy. We strongly urge you all to attend, learn about the operation of our Parish, and provide input into the governance and betterment of our Parish. Improvement is a continuous process and the more people involved in the effort, the better we can and will be.

With everything going on, please bear in mind that we have set the dates for the 2019 Greek Food Festival: Friday, September 27 through Sunday, September 29. Please get these dates on your calendars.

In closing, we want to again thank the various Church ministries and organizations, and the many individuals for all the work they do. It clearly takes a lot of work from the entire community to maintain our Church. Please step forward whenever you can and pitch in. We know many things are always happening, but they are extremely important. Please get involved as we move forward to make our Church better.

Stewardship and Community Outreach

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Glory to God for all things! By God's grace our Parish successfully navigated the financial challenges that seem to beset us every year. While the challenge to meet our financial obligations grows each year, 2018 turned out to be the best year for Stewardship in our Parish in the past 14 years, and probably ever. The total gifts received in Stewardship from our Parishioners exceeded \$405,500 – an increase of nearly \$25,000 over 2017.

Thanks to the clear and concise presentation of our Parish Council President, Gus Flangas, which laid out the financial challenges our Parish faces, a noticeable number of our parishioners increased their 2018 Stewardship. They prayerfully looked into their hearts and increased their giving from between \$50 to \$2,000. Since the beginning of 2019 many of these same parishioners have offered a larger portion of their first fruits by pledging as much as 33% more in 2019 than they did in 2018. These members of our Parish are the ones offering more of their first fruits of labor and they will be rewarded according to His grace: "Honor the Lord from your righteous labors, and offer Him the first fruits from the fruits of your righteousness, that your storehouses may be filled with abundance of grain, and your winepresses may gush with wine." (Proverbs 3:9-10)

As our facilities continue to age, we can no longer afford to put off necessary repairs to the Church and the Community Center. The basic operating budget for 2018 was \$1,004,466. While the financial Stewardship received grew, it still only covered approximately 40.38% of this budget, which is pretty much in line with what Stewardship has covered over the past decade or longer. At this moment, the roof in the kitchen must be replaced and the cost for this is estimated at \$40,000. By God's grace, following Father



John's appeal, a few parishioners immediately stepped up and donated the necessary funds to repair this roof. Unfortunately, the necessary revenue stream needed to facilitate other major repairs that have been put off are not available to the Parish at this time. Only through the increased giving of the members of our Parish will we be able to make the necessary repairs to our facility and continue meeting the spiritual needs of His flock.

For those who have pledged for 2019 and lovingly and prayerfully increased their pledge, may the Lord's blessing be with you and your family. For those who have not yet pledged, we ask that you please look into your hearts. Feel the love God has for you and return more of the first fruits of your labor. Make a concerted effort to increase your pledge, working toward the goal of returning to the Lord a tenth of the gifts He has bestowed upon you – for everything we have was given to us by Him and without Him we would have nothing. I pray we will all take to heart what St. Paul entreats us to do – that is, to sow bountifully so that we may reap bountifully. (2 Corinthians 9:6)

By God's Grace, the Ladies Philoptochos Society Panagia Chapter is pleased to announce the 60th Anniversary Celebration of St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church in Las Vegas, Nevada. Please mark your calendars for the weekend of November 8, 9 and 10, 2019.

Our Church Family has experienced many blessings over the past six decades:

- 1959 We worshipped in a meeting room at the Elwell Hotel and at Christ Episcopal Church
- 1969 1993 We were baptized, married and buried in our sweet little East Carson Avenue Church
- 1971 Burning of the Mortgage, Carson Avenue Church
- 1973 First Greek Food Festival
- 1990 A New Beginning, groundbreaking on El Camino Road for our new Church Campus
- 1992 Raising of the Dome
- 1992 *Thyranoixia*, Opening of the Doors
- 1997 Burning of the Mortgage, El Camino Road Church
- 2003 Jewel in the Crown Grand Opening of St. John the Baptist Community and Education Center
- 2005 Sacred Consecration of our beloved Church
- 2005 2006 Iconography First and Second Phases
- 2009 Our Golden Heritage, the 50th Anniversary of our Church Community

Sixty years! Those of us who were here from the beginning, those of us who arrived mid-way, and those of us who are new to the community are blessed with the joy of worshipping in His magnificent Byzantine Church and enjoying fellowship in our Community Center and beautiful park-like grounds.

The cost of this remarkable project has been Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000.000.00). In 2005, the outstanding mortgage on the St. John the Baptist Community and Education Center was \$800,000. 13 years later, we still owe \$300,000. It is time that we, as a Church Family, unite in purpose to pay our debt.

The Ladies Philoptochos Society has been entrusted with the chairmanship of the 60th Anniversary Celebration of November 8, 9 and 10, 2019. As a forerunner to the 60th Anniversary Celebration and in order to pay our outstanding mortgage in full, we are presenting a "\$300,000 One Year Plan" so that a year from now we can also celebrate being debt-free. From Father Seraphim

Everyone is searching for love. St. Gregory the Theologian, in his *Oration on Pascha*, says that "God was not content to contemplate Himself." He wanted others to share in His goodness and life, so He called all things into being from nothing. Last of all came man, created uniquely in the Divine Image of God, Who "is love." (1 John 4:8) We were made for love and for no other reason. Christianity is thus the greatest love story in the history of the universe, for when we had fallen away from God out of self-love, the deception of the Devil, and a fixation on the created world, we could no longer see God face to face or "walk with Him in the garden of paradise." (Genesis 2:8) We were separated by an impassible chasm of our own making and the God Who loves us could not stand it to be so. What was God to do? He went looking for His beloved and "He bent the heavens and came down." (Psalm 18:9) Not finding Adam and Eve on Earth, in His humility God went down searching for them, even in Hades. Christ entered the mystery of death and once again in the darkness of the underworld, Adam and Eve heard the same footsteps they had once enjoyed in Eden and knew that their imprisonment to the Devil was finally over.

Why start with such a "big picture" of the human race, sin, God and creation . . . when talking about love during this romantic month of Valentine's Day, which is replete with hearts, balloons and chocolates? It is because we all truly do "just want love" and many times we do not know where to look. If we first acknowledge like Blessed Augustine that "the heart is restless until it rests in God," then maybe we would not

have to spend a large part of our lives flitting desperately from so many "little loveless loves" and come to know the only One Who loves mankind. Jesus Christ is the ultimate desire of all desires, and the Saints who experienced the lightning flashes of His Divine Light and indescribable love wandered about the earth for the rest of their life unable to be swayed by any temporal beauty. What sunset, painting, or beautiful body could compare to the ecstasy of Divine Grace? St. Silouan of Mt. Athos, for example, saw the risen Christ walk out of the icon in the iconostasis and he said of this experience that the Face of Christ was so sweet, so radiantly tender and beautiful that if Jesus had remained before him for even one more second, his soul would have left his body and he would have departed this life then and there in the Church.



This, highest of loves cost the Saints their entire life. For us who live in the world, go to grocery stores, raise children, work jobs and pay rent, mortgages and taxes – these experiences can seem like unreachable fairy tales amidst the drudgery and difficulty of our daily life. However, there is a sanctification that comes from living in the world and serving one's spouse, children or neighbors as if they were Christ, and receiving the love of God in and through these persons. This is the fulfillment of that second of Jesus' two greatest commandments – "to love our neighbor as ourselves." (Matthew 22:39) Perhaps we are not married, but there must be someone with whom God has allowed us to come into contact that needs our love as well. In doing this we begin to taste the grace of God and smell the scent of paradise. For each of us, married or not, in order to find true and lasting love we must be willing to serve those around us with selfless love: "Whosoever shall seek to save his life shall lose it; and whosoever shall lose his life shall preserve it." (Luke 17:33) Love ultimately means sacrifice and the words so often spoken, "I love you," lose meaning quickly if not backed up by deeds of love and sacrifice. Indeed, God proved His eternal love for us by hanging upon the Cross for our redemption.

This Valentine's Day, let's not forget that all earthly beauties and joys are only sweet and lasting if they have Christ Himself as their root and source. If we forget the eternal dimension of the person we love – even if we provide an incredible meal or a romantic getaway – then we have made an idol out of what should have been an icon (an image of God's Presence and glory). Let us love God and one another in a genuine and selfless way, so that we may find lasting satisfaction, true peace, ultimate fulfillment, and the joy that never can be taken from us.


Greek Language Program




